





Mrs. So then said that I could have the video but she would cut the bone fragment in half and return half to her associates in Cambodia. I told her that the importance of this meeting was to establish herself as a credible importance of this meeting was to establish herself as a credible source of information to the U.S. government. She would do this by that the spirit will never rest if you keep part of the bone. The war is over, let me take charge of the remains so that they can be given to the family for a long overdue burial." Mr. and Mrs. So conferred in Cambodian and he seemed to persuade her. She said oxay, I could have the bone, but she would return the dog tag. I asked if I could at least copy the information off the tag so that the bone could be identified. She agreed. The dog tag was vintage early 1960's. It still had both a service serial number and a Social Security Number, and it did not have the out out notch in the bottom part of the tag, i.e.,

- (S/NF/WN/RODCA) Enclosure #3 is a video tape showing Mrs. Sc interacting socially with various people, some of which are the Cambodian based Vietnamese affiliates. As the film rolls, it depicts a dinner scene in Da Nang, Vietnam. The woman in a pink top is Mrs. 55 55 is the man in a white shirt with pin strips and his arm around a man in a blue/gray shirt. 55 is the man seated at the head of the table with his back to the bar. 55 is the man seated in the third position on the right side of the table -- this perspective of 55 is oriented from the viewer's right:
- (S/NF/WN/RODCA) Video tape number one (enclosure #3) was not the primary tape intended for my viewing, but Mrs. 5C wanted me to see it to show me the dinner party. I asked for the tape. Mrs. was at first reluctant and I suggested that she copy it on her video recorder. I said, "If you expect one of my Washington, DC, colleagues to travel to Cambodia, they must know with whom they would be meeting. " She agreed with this and, after copying the tape, gave me the original.

10. (S/NF/WN/RODCA) I asked Mr. 55 "Why are the POW's surfacing now after so many years?" He said, "There are many live American: POW's. The Vietnamese government wants to use them for the future." I then posed the questions from IO D-VOP-2430-11-90 on "Movement of Prisoners to Countries." Mr. 55 stated he knew nothing of this. He said that they have been kept in caves around Nha Trang and Da Nang. He said that there are 23 POW's somewhere around Nha Trang in caves and 46 POW's in caves around Da Nang. I asked Mr. and Mrs. SC if they had seen these caves and they said, "No." I felt they knew more than they were indicating. I asked if they had even seen live POW's and Mrs. SC responded, "Yes." . I .. asked where and she said that the Vietnamese officers identified in paragraphs 7 and 8, above, had arranged for her to view three POW s. I asked her to draw me a map and show me the location. She stated that she traveled by motorcycle on the Coastal Highway approximately 13 kilometers north of Wha Trang, Vietnam, then turned toward the sea onto: a small horse cart type road. Traveling on the road, she passed an elongated body of water off to her right. In the distance shead of her were mountains. Farther down the road, beyond the body of water and to the left side of the road, she arrived at a small hut/house/compound that was guarded by Vietnamese soldiers. At this location she was allowed to view three American POW's from a distance of about 10-15 maters. These men were brought to this



They stated it must remain secret or also all the POW's would be killed if the Vietnamese government was confronted with the subject. For that reason, her people want to use Cambodia as a safe zone to negotiate the POW issue. Mrs. SC again stated that she wants a U.S. government representative to travel with her to Cambodia, posing as her boyfriend -- someone who could speak for the U.S. government and aventually take control of a POW. But, it will take money to bribe the controlling officials. Enclosure 1 lays out the Vietnamese negotiating positions, 200K per POW.)

Comments: (S/NF/WN/RODCA) The attitude demonstrated and expressed by both parties debriefed would be characterized as monetary vice humanitarian. It was my impression that statements made to me were not spontaneous but preconsidered and scripted. I further felt that the statements were credible and the sources wanted to convey that this effort was a rogus operation by a breakaway few. I feel that due to the overall organization this may be part of a much larger effort, perhaps even one sponsored by the Vietnamese government as an effort to raise much needed capital and divest itself of the POW's in a non-attributable manner, since the Vietnamese government has stated that there are no live POW's. Mrs. SC was provided a contact phone number to use upon her return to CONUS. She is leaving for Cambodia to meet her Vietnamese contacts, date of return unknown.

Congressional Briefings

- + On 20 February, VO provided a PW/MIA mission briefing for Rep. James Charke.
- + VO met with Rep. Bob Smith on 5 February. The meeting was in response to requests Mr. Smith made for PW/MIA related intelligence.

- Staff Briefings

- + A game plan for briefing Congressional staffers on DIA efforts on the PW/MIA issue has been prepared and will be implemented.
 - -- The plan calls for at least two group briefings by VO.
 - -- The staffers will be given a tour of the PW/MIA Special Office to meet analysts and get a feel for the size of the operation.
- + Invitee's will include staff members from the appropriate House and Senate Committees, subcommittees and representatives of individual members, particularly those serving on the Task Force.
 - -- DI-3 is in the process of identifying the staffers to be invited.
 - -- The first briefing is tentatively scheduled for mid to late April.
- Infrastructure Collection Requirements
 - Collection requirements relating to the "PW signature" are now out.
 - -- Related to this effort the Armed Forces Medical Intelligence Center has temporarily assigned an officer to the PW/MIA Office to develop medical requirements.



Remains Identified

- The remains of four missing servicemen have been positively identified. They are:
 - Col Thomas F. Case, USAF, lost 31 May 1966 "
 - -- LCDR Richard C. Perry, USN, lost 31 August 1967 -- LT Henry S. McWhorter, USN, lost 29 August 1965

 - LCDR Philip C. Craig, USN, lost 4 July 1967
- All four were lost in aircraft incidents in North Vietnam.
 - Two of the remains were repatriated by the SRV in April 1986 and the other two in November 1986.

This brings the number of unaccounted for to 2,417.

Talk Stalled

- Efforts to schedule technical talks with the Vietnamese and policy level delegation meetings with both the SRV and Lao, have been unsuccessful.
 - There have been no tech talks since October.
 - It appears that the "two year plan" may be off track, particularly in the area of tech talks which are supposed to take place at least six times a year.
- The Lao are also stalling on repeated U.S. requests for another crash site excavation.

Special Office Personnel

- The seven additional civilian billets have been approved by RHR-1 and are now in the hands of the recruitment people. It is hoped the announcements will be out by next week.
- The four military billets have been approved by RHR-3.
 - Services are being approached for nominees.

ADP Status (

Delivery of the new PW/MIA data base is progressing more slowly than anticipated, but testing should begin next week.



Private Adventurers

- + Unconfirmed reports that James "Bo" Gritz is in Thailand continue to surface.
 - -- Sources allege that he plans to pay \$1.2 million in exchange for four PWs; with three more men to the ransomed Water.
 - -- U.S. and Thai authorities have been alerted.
- + American citizen Jack Bailey has provided U.S. officials, via the offices of Ross Perot, with two small packets of what are alleged to be the remains of American MIAs.
 - -- The packets are said to include skull fragments and some teeth.
 - -- Bailey's record on remains return is spotty. In the past he has furnished animal bones and mongoloid remains, in addition to other human fragments which may be American, but were unidentifiable.
 - -- The remains have been sent to the Central Identification Laboratory for study.

Response to Media Queries

- + The PW/MIA Special Office prepared summaries dealing with the identified sources who appeared in the BBC production, "We Can Keep You Forever."
 - -- These sources and their stories were known to DIA analysts.
 - -- The information was used in an OASD/PA paper providing press guidance to respond to public queries.

Interview

- + A Special Office analyst interviewed and polygraphed a Taiwanese national who has been involved in providing false PW reporting.
 - -- He was polygraphed in an effort to determine if he had conspired with others to provide false data.
 - ++: Preliminary polygraph results indicate he was not invloved in a conspiracy.
- * This same source had also been imprisoned in Vietnam for five years and it has been determined that he was the subject of several heretofore unresolved live sighting reports.



Dog Tag Reports

+ A Vietnamese refugee residing in the U.S. has provided DIA analysts with information which appears to establish direct linkage between the Vietnamese intelligence service and the dog tag reports flooding the U.S.

- U.S. Delegation Talks in Hanoi
 - A U.S. delegation headed by NSC Director of Asian Affairs Richard Childress met with Vietnamese officials in Hanoi on 26-28 May.
 - Agenda included laying the foundation for General Vessey's possible trip to Hanoi.
 - The delegation has not yet issued a report of their talks, but Vietnamese press statements indicate they are considering the U.S. proposal.
 - Although the Vietnamese reaffirmed that the PW/MIA accounting is considered humanitarian and separate from other outstanding issues, they repeatedly returned to the theme that the U.S. needs to "improve the atmosphere."
 - The U.S. representatives made it clear to the Vietnamese that Vessey could listen to other concerns, although he would not be instructed on other issues.
 - To follow on the delegation meetings the U.S. has proposed dates in late June for technical talks in Hanoi.
 - Collection Team Support
 - VO-PW continued to provide individual training/briefings to members of the "Stoney Beach" collection team.
 - ADP equipment was secured for use by the team.
 - Selected PW/MIA files were adapted for use with the ADP equipment.
- Brief to JCRC Rep
 - , who has been assigned to the JCRC liaison office in Bangkok, visited VO-PW in mid-May for two days of briefings and orientation prior to his departure for Thailand.

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- Lao Charge

+ The U.S. Charge to Laos, Name , met with VO-PW on 11 May for an update briefing.

Representative Smith

- + The PW/MIA Special Office continues to provide answers to numerous oral questions posed by Congressman Robert Smith (R-NH).
- + The League of Families board of directors has come out opposed to the legislation introduced by Mr. Smith which would require that DIA publicly release all "live-sighting" reports.

Hendon Activities

- + Former Rep. Bill Hendon has been attempting to meet with both the Lao and Vietnamese.
 - -- Hendon has sought Vietnamese permission to travel to Hanoi to relay a message from "several members of the U.S. Government."
 - -- Both the Lao and Vietnamese have declined his request and have voiced their displeasure with his million dollar reward offer.

Support to General Vessey

- + In reponse to a request from General John Vessey, VO-PW prepared a detailed paper regarding unaccounted for Americans listed as prisoners at the end of the war.
 - -- Vessey was particularly interested in negotiation efforts on behalf of these individuals, how many have been accounted for, etc.

- PW Hoax

- Photographs which allegedly depict two Marine Corps MIAs, who were rumored to be in New York last month, have been received from the American citizen who had originally made the claim to DoD.
 - -- Soon 'after furnishing the photos, the source called to report that the entire story was a hoax, which he would expose in an upcoming magazine article.



Cuban Involvement

+ Congressman Robert Dornan (R-CA) has asked VO-PW to check into reports that a Cuban, who is currently attached to that country's United Nations delegation, is the infamous "Fidel" who tortured U.S. PWs during the war.

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-- The photos will be shown to former PWs in the area who are familiar with "Fidel."

- Technical Talks in Hanoi Vietnamese Visit Hawaii
 - + On 1-3 June, Joint Casualty Resolution Center (JCRC) representatives met with their Vietnamese counterparts in Hanoi to discuss progress in MIA case investigations.
 - The Vietnamese claim to have information and/or remains on "32 instances," and made a point in saying that there are no remains associated with at least seven of the "instances."
 - No date for remains repatriation has been set.
 - In late June a Vietnamese delegation toured the JCRC and Central Identification Laboratory (CIL) in Hawaii.
 - They familiarized themselves with some of the equipment the U.S. is furnishing them.
 - At the CIL the Vietnamese were shown problem cases from past repatriations and their assistance was sought in improving their search and recovery procedures.
 - According to JCRC, the "Vietnamese appeared sincere in doing their utmost to investigate the discrepancy cases and to accept practical help."
- Vessey and Thach Meet in New York
 - On 8 June, Presidential Emissary General John W. Vessey, Jr. met with Vietnamese Foreign Minister Nguyen Co Thach at the U.S. Mission to the United Nations.
 - Thach said the Vietnamese would work seriously to fulfill agreements reached last August with General Vessey.
 - ++ He specifically agreed to the late June meeting in Hawaii and said they would continue to work the so-called discrepancy cases.

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- Lao Activities

- + Lao Vice Foreign Minister Soubanh Srithirath visited Washington, D.C., in early June, meeting with U.S. officials to discuss PW/MIAs, narcotics and other issues.
 - -- Enroute home he stopped in Hawaii to visit JCRC and CIL.
- + The U.S. Charge in Laos reports that Soubanh seemed pleased with his visit and has since told her that he is trying to arrange a Lao/U.S. PW/MIA technical meeting for late July.
- DIA Analyst TDY to Hong Kong
 - + A VO-PW analyst is in Hong Kong to further interview a refugee source who after months of discussions with has provided some 75 PW/MIA reports, to include a dozen stories of captured Americans.
 - -- DIA analysts have devoted months attempting to correlate the source's reports (he claimed to be assigned to investigate downed aircraft during the war) to actual U.S. losses.
 - -- Much of the source's information was uncorrelatable.
 - -- As a result of the analyst interview and polygraph, it has been determined that the source's information was fabricated.
 - + The analyst has also reinterviewed and polygraphed another refugee source in Hong Kong who claims to have discovered "warehoused" U.S. remains in northern Vietnam in 1981.
 - -- Preliminary indications are that the source is probably telling the truth.
- Joint Debriefing

+ DIA analysts, working with and FBI, conducted a debriefing and polygraph of a Lao citizen.

- -- The Lao reported what he believed to be information regarding communist policy on the PW/MIA accounting.
- + Based on the interview, polygraph and corroborating data from a separate source, it is believed the Lao is a professional Ministry of Interior case officer, trained by the Vietnamese and KGB, now on a mission in the U.S. which is directed against the U.S. Government, the Lao resistance, and certain Lao residents of the U.S.

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- Remains of Missing Identified

- + The remains of four Americans who were repatriated in March and April have been positively identified. All are Air Force.
 - -- Major Charles E. Blair, missing since March 1968
 - -- First Lieutenant Vincent Chiarello, missing since July 1966
 - -- Sergeant John Mamiya, missing since July 1966
 - -- Sergeant Herbert Smith, missing since July 1966

- Congressional Activities

- + On 9 June, the VO-PW Chief privately briefed the House PW/MIA Task Force leadership on current DIA activities.
 - -- Those briefed include Task Force Chairman Robert Lagomarsino (R-CA), and Vice Chairmen Benjamin Gilman (R-NY) and Gerald Solomon (R-NY).
- + The entire, Task Force was provided an update briefing on 15 June.

- Cases Resolved

- + The Interagency Committee PW/MIA review panel met on 1 June to discuss analyst findings on 43 alleged firsthand sightings of U.S. personnel in Indochina.
 - -- The review panel approved the analyst findings in each of the cases.
- + The Committee is scheduled to review additional cases on 26 July, so that DIA statistics are current for the League Annual meeting the last weekend of the month.

- "Rats" and PWs Briefed

- + The VO-PW Chief briefed some 500 attendees at a combined reunion of the Red River Valley Fighter Pilots Association (River Rats) and NAM POWs (former PWs from the Vietnam war) on 25 June.
 - -- While the River Rats receive a yearly PW/MIA update, this was the first time that either organization had been briefed by DIA.
 - -- The hour long presentation was very well received.

- Smith Jailed
 - + Former Army Major Mark Smith (of Smith/McIntire lawsuit fame) was jailed in Thailand on 21 June on fraud charges. He is claiming to have just been brought in for questioning, but as of 28 June was still being held.

- A. JAMES MCFARLAND, ONE OF THE GROUP MEMBERS, TOLD Source HE OBSERVED RETIRED U.S. ARMY SPECIAL FORCES MAJOR MARK A. SMITH CROSS THE MEKONG RIVER, AT KHEMMARAT AND ENTER LAOS FROM THAILAND ON 5

ING RIVER A

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SEPTEMBER 1987. THE PURPOSE OF HIS MISSION WAS TO EFFECT THE RESCUE OF WHAT HE HAD BEEN LED TO BELIEVE WERE "LIVE U.S. PWS IN LAOS". SOUVE SAID HE AND OTHER MEMBERS OF THE GROUP BELIEVED SMITH'S VENTURE WAS TIMED TO COINCIDE WITH A LATE SEP 87 LAUNCH OF BALLOONS FROM THAILAND BY VARIOUS AMERICAN PRIVATE CITIZENS LED BYS FORMER CONGRESSMAN BILL HENDON. THE BALLOON LAUNCH DID NOT OCCUR AS PLANNED. SOUTH HAS NO DIRECT KNOWLEDGE THAT SMITH ACTUALLY CROSSED INTO LAOS.

- B. MARK SMITH WAS TO HAVE RETURNED TO THAILAND BY 1 OCT 87. SINCE HE HAS NOT BEEN SEEN OR HEARD OF SINCE THAT DATE, AND OTHERS BELIEVE MARK SMITH MAY HAVE BEEN KILLED OR CAPTURED IN LAOS. SMITH'S PERSONAL PROPERTY WAS REMOVED FROM HIS LAST BANGKOK RESIDENCE, THE NANACONDO HOTEL, BY JAMES MCFARLAND AND WAS TAKEN TO THE DEEP DIGGINGS BAR IN BANGKOK FOR TEMPORARY STORAGE.
- C. THE PRIVATE FORAY INTO LAOS WAS COORDINATED IN THAILAND THROUGH PHOUMANO NOSAVAN. ONE OR MEMBERS OF THE GROUP SAID PHOUMANO NOSAVAN MAINTAINED COURIER CONTACT WITH SMITH AFTER HE ENTERED LAOS AND MAY BE THE ONLY RESIDENT OF THAILAND WHO MAY HAVE KNOWLEDGE OF SMITH'S FATE. HAS NO DIRECT KNOWLEDGE OF THESE REPORTED COURIER CONTACTS WITH PHOUMANO.
- D. MCFARLAND SAID OTHER PRIVATE FORAY MEMBERS WHO ENTERED LAOS FROM THAILAND WITH MARK SMITH INCLUDED A 60 MAN SECURITY GUARD ELEMENT PROVIDED BY PHOUMANO NOSAVAN, CHAO SIT NACHAMPASSACK, AND AN ETHNIC VIETNAMESE U.S. RESIDENT NAMED TAI DO ((PHONETIC)). THE FATE OF THESE INDIVIDUALS IS UNKNOWN.
- E. OTHER PRIVATE FORAY MEMBERS WHO REMAINED IN THAILAND AND DID NOT ENTER LAOS RETURNED TO THE U.S., EXCEPT TIM WILLIAMS, IN OCT 87. THEY INCLUDE COMMERCIAL AIR PILOT AND PORTSMITH, N.H RESIDENT JAMES MCFARLAND ((PHONETIC)); AN ETHNIC VIETNAMESE RESIDENT OF SAN DIEGO, CA. NAMED TAT ((PHONETIC)); A NATIONAL FORGET-ME-NOT DIRECTOR NAMED TIM (AKA "TIMMY") WILLIAMS; WILLIAM (AKA "BILLY") MARTIN, A PRIVATE BUSINESSMAN FROM THE SAN DIEGO, CA AREA; SAN DIEGO AREA RESIDENT LENNY HOOK; BETH STEWART, A WASHINGTON, D.C. ATTORNEY, DAUGHTER OF A U.S. AIR FORCE COLONEL MIA, AND PURPORTED "GIRL FRIEND" OF MARK SMITH; AND, AN UNIDENTIFIED FEMALE REPORTER FROM THE WASHINGTON, D.C. AREA. "BILLY" MARTIN EXPENDED APPROXIMATELY \$75,000 IN SUPPORT OF THE PRIVATE FORAY, APPROXIMATELY \$25,000 OF WHICH WAS USED TO MEET FOOD, LODGING, AND OTHER EXPENSES OF THE GROUP IN THAILAND DURING APR-OCT 87.
- F. FUNDING FOR THE PRIVATE FORAY AMOUNTED TO OVER \$300,000, AT LEAST SOME OF WHICH WAS FROM A DALLAS, TX, BANK IN BLANK BANK MONEY ORDERS. WHILE IN THAILAND MARK SMITH DIRECTED LENNY HOOK TO SIGN APPROXIMATELY \$24,000 OF THESE MONEY ORDERS PAYABLE TO FAYETTEVILLE, NC. ATTORNEY MARK WAPLE AND FORGE THE SIGNATURE OF AN ETHNIC LAO, TEXAS-BASED LAO RESISTANCE ACTIVIST KHAMHOU BOUSSARATH.
- MOUNT OF MONEY" FROM LEGAL EXPENSES. SourceWAS LED TO BELIEVE THAT THE \$24,000 WAS INTENED TO SATISFY AT LEAST PART OF THAT OBLIGATION.
- G. THE MAJORITY OF \$300,000 Soura WAS TOLD BY SMITH HAD BEEN SENT TO THAILAND FOR USE BY THE PRIVATE FORAY, BECAME UNACCOUNTED SECRET

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FOR, MONEY WHICH WAS PURPORTEDLY TO HAVE GONE TO PHOUVANO NOSAVAN IN THAILAND. LOWECHEARD FROM ONE OR MORE MEMBERS OF THE GROUP THAT PHOUMANO STATED HE INTENDED TO KILL MARK SMITH WHEN HE EXITED LAOS BECAUSE SMITH HAD CHEATED HIM OUT OF THE \$300,000 WHICH WAS TO HAVE GONE TO HIM TO SUPPORT THE PRIVATE FORAY.

H. TWO ETHNIC VIETNAMESE RESIDENTS OF SAN DIEGO, MR TAT ((PHONETIC)) AND MR. TAI DO ((PHONETIC)) ENTERED THAILAND ON BOGUS TAIWANESE PASSPORTS WHEN THEY ARRIVED TO PROVIDE SUPPORT FOR THE SMITH FORAY. TAT AND TAI DO WERE BELIEVED TO BE THE SOURCES OF THE PW/MIA INFORMATION TO "BILLY" MARTIN WHICH THEY USED BOTH TO LEAD WILLIAMS TO MARK SMITH AND PROVIDE THEM AND SMITH WITH \$75,000 IN FINANCIAL SUPPORT. MR. TAT, UNEMPLOYED AND BELIEVED TO BE ON WELFARE, WAS ALSO INVOLVED IN RECEIVING MONEY FROM VIETNAMESE IN CALIFORNIA AS PAYOFFS TO ARRANGE FOR THE ESCAPE OF VIETNAMESE FROM VIETNAM. MR. 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

MR. MACFARLAND PROVIDED HIS BUSINESS CARD TO Jource WHICH IDENTIFIED HIM AS A MEMBER OF THE "JFK CREW, AMERICAN AIRLINES", RESIDING IN PORTSMOUTH, NH. HIS BUSINESS CARD ALSO IDENTIFIED HIM AS "POW-MIA, JAMES MACFARLAND, MAJOR, USAR, INF". THE BUSINESS CARD CONTAINED A SMALL LOGO WHICH APPEARED TO BE A HELICOPTER. MR. MACFARLAND CLAIMED HE HAD PROVIDED SOME OF HIS OWN PRIVATE FUNDS TO ASSIST THE PRIVATE FORAY GROUP. (VO-PW COMMENT: WITH THE EXCEPTION OF THE LOGO, OTHER BUSINESS CARD DATA APPEARS SIMILAR TO A BUSINESS CARD REPORTEDLY USED BY AN ETHNIC LAO/CHINESE U .S. RESIDENT NAMED SAYFA PHONGSAVANH (AKA SAIFA PHONGSAVANH). MR. SAYFA PRODUCED THIS CARD IN 1984 IN CONJUNCTION WITH AN EFFORT, APPARENTLY LINKED TO PHOUMANO NOSAVAN, TO RECOVER WHAT WAS PURPORTED TO BE TWO LIVE U.S. PWS IN VIENTIANE PROVINCE, LAOS. DIA/VO-PW HAS CONCLUDED THE FACTS IN THE 1984/SAYFA CASE APPEAR LINKED TO INFORMATION WHICH WAS ORIGINATED BY THE LAO MINISTRY OF INTERIOR IN AN ATTEMPT TO ENTICE RESISTANCE PERSONNEL INTO LAOS.)

B. MARK SMITH, A RETIRED U.S. ARMY SPECIAL FORCES MAJOR AND FORMER U.S. PW, WAS THE PRIMARY OPERATIONAL INDIVIDUAL IN WHAT SOURCE/TERMED "AN OBVIOUS SCAM." IN AUG 87 MARK SMITH TRAVELED TO SINGAPORE TO OBTAIN A NEW U.S. PASSPORT TO REPLACE THE PASSPORT HE

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WAS THLN USING. HE STATED TO Source THAT HIS "OLD PASSPORT" HAD "TOO MANY ENTRIES" IN IT AND HE (MARK SMITH) NEEDED A NEW PASSPORT TO GET THINGS "CLEANED UP." MR. SMITH OBTAINED PASSPORT 012997372 FROM THE AMEMB SINGAPORE CLAIMING HIS OLDER PASSPORT HAD BEEN DESTROYED WHEN, FROM Source'S KNOWLEDGE, MARK SMITH HAD MERELY RIPPLD A PAGE OUT OF HIS OLDER PASSPORT AND USED IT TO CLAIM THE ENTIRE PASSPORT WAS DESTROYED WHEN HE APPLIED FOR A NEW ONE IN SINGAPORE. MARK SMITH CLAIMED HE HAD "INTEL" ABOUT "LIVE U.S. PWS" IN LAOS AND HAD OBTAINED HIS INFORMATION FROM "THE SAME PLACE AS "BO" GRITZ." WHILE AT NKP SMITH DEALT WITH A THAI INTELLIGENCE OFFICER CONTACT NAMED EITHER THANOM OR SANOM (PHONETIC). (VO-PW COMMENT: SANOM MAY EQUATE TO ROYAL THAI GENERAL SANAN WHO HAS BEEN IDENTIFIED AS A THAI BASED ASSOCIATE OF MARK SMITH AS EARLY AS 1982.) DURING HIS ASSOCIATION WITH MARK SMITH, IT APPEARED MARK SMITH WAS IN A DEEP DEPRESSION AFTER HIS FORMER VIETNAMESE WIFE HAD TAKEN CUSTODY OF THEIR TWO CHILDREN WHO HAD BEEN LIVING WITH HIM IN CALIFORNIA, Source STATED HE HAD THE IMPRESSION MUCH OF SMITH'S ENERGY SEEMED TO BE SOME WAY OF TRYING TO COMPENSATE FOR THE LOSS OF HIS TWO CHILDREN WITH WHOM HE WAS VERY CLOSE. MARK SMITH ROUTINELY HAD HIS U.S. ARMY RETIRED PAY SENT TO HIS MOTHER, A RESIDENT IN THE LOS ANGELES AREA WHO COULD BE REACHED AT 213-542-8281. WHILE MARK SMITH WAS IN THAILAND SHE RECEIVED AND DEPOSITED HIS RETIREMENT CHECK, DISBURSED MONEY TO SMITH'S TWO CHILDREN, AND FORWARDED THE REST TO HIM IN THAILAND. ! So wees DID NOT BELIEVE THAT MARK SMITH'S MOTHER WAS AS YET AWARE OF HER SON'S CURRENT PREDICAMENT. (VO-PW COMMENT: RETIRED U.S. ARMY LTC "BO" GRITZ, INVOLVED IN PRIOR PRIVATE FORAYS INTO LAOS. IDENTIFIED HIS SOURCE OF PW/MIA INFORMATION AS AN ETHNIC RESIDENT OF THAILAND NAMED LOH THERAPHANT. DIA/VO-PW HAS CONCLUDED MR. THERAPHANT IS LINKED TO VIETNAMESE HOSTILE INTELLIGENCE AND SECURITY).

C. MARK WAPLE, AN ATTORNEY WORKING FOR FORMER CONG. BILL HENDON, NEVER ACTUALLY CAME TO THAILAND BUT REMAINED "THE GROUP" POINT OF CONTACT IN THE U.S., ACCORDING TO STATEMENTS BY MARK SMITH AND JAMES MACFARLAND TO SOURCE. MARK SMITH TOLD MARK SMITH TOLD THAT MARK WAPLE WAS REPRESENTING HIM AND SERGEANT MCINTYRE IN THEIR LAW SUIT AGAINST THE U.S. GOVERNMENT FOR A "COVER-UP" ON THE PW/MIA ISSUE. BASED ON STATEMENTS BY MACFARLAND/SMITH TO MARK WAPLE WAS THEIR LINKAGE WITH FORMER CONGRESSMAN BILLY HENDON. MARK WAPLE PROVIDED HIS BUSINESS CARD TO MEMBERS OF THE GROUP, IDENTIFYING HIMSELF AS MARK WAPLE, AN ATTORNEY WITH THE FIRM OF MARK WAPLE & HUTCHINSON, IN FAYETTEVILLE, NC. ACCORDING TO MARK SMITH, MARK WAPLE WAS A WEST POINT GRADUATE AND A FORMER MILITARY LAWYER BEFORE DEPARTING THE SERVICE FOR PRIVATE PRACTICE.

D. BILLY HENDON, A FORMER NORTH CAROLINA CONGRESSMAN, REMAINED OUT OF THE PICTURE UNTIL A BALLOON EPISODE IN LATE SEPTEMBER, 1987 AFTER MARK SMITH HAD ALREADY ENTERED LAOS, IN WHICH HE AND OTHERS ATTEMPTED TO LAUNCH BALLOONS WITH PRIVATE PW/MIA REWARD NOTICES FROM THAILAND TOWARD LAOS. HEARD MACFARLAND/MARK SMITH SPEAK OF CONG. HENDON, STATING SMITH KEPT ASKING HENDON TO COME TO THAILAND BUT HENDON WANTED TO WAIT UNTIL THERE WAS SOMETHING SUBSTANTIVE AND SMITH WAS READY TO "LAUNCH" INTO LAOS. (VO-PW-COMMENT: STATED THAT THE NAME "BILLY," TO THOSE INVOLVED

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IN THE PRIVATE FORAY, WOULD ALWAYS HAVE MEANT "BILLY" MARTIN AND WOULD NOT HAVE BEEN USED TO REFER TO CONGRESSMAN HENDON.) E. TIM (AKA "TIMMY") WILLIAMS, WHO PROVIDED Source; WITH HIS BUSINESS CARD IDENTIFYING HIMSELF AS DIRECTOR, NATIONAL FORGET-ME-NOTS, IN FLORIDA. TIM STATED HE HAD BEEN A DOG TRAINER WHEN HE SERVED IN VIETNAM. TIM STATED HE HAD BEEN WORKING CLOSELY WITH PHOUMANO NOSAVAN AND HAD SOME TYPE OF "POW OPERATION" IN FLORIDA. F. PHOUMANO NOSAVAN, SON OF FORMER LAO RESISTANCE LEADER PHOUMI NOSAVAN, OPERATOR OF A JEWELRY BUSINESS IN BANGKOK. Source HAD THE DISTINCT IMPRESSION PHOUMANO NOSAVAN WAS ONLY INTERESTED IN HIS JEWELRY BUSINESS AND HAD LITTLE REAL INTEREST IN MARK SMITH'S VENTURC. PHOUMANO'S BUSINESS CARD READ "UFILL CHIEF, BUREAU OF COORDINATION 92 SOI 10 BANGKOK, 589-5799, TELEX 82731 DENTACO TH ATTN: PU." (VO-PW COMMENT: THE MEANING OF THE ACRONYM "UFILL" IS UNKNOWN BUT PROBABLY RELATES TO PHOUMANO'S "RESISTANCE" GROUP.) PHOUMANO WORKED OUT OF BANGKOK AND NAKHOM PHANOM, THAILAND, AND WAS IDENTIFIED TO Source BY BOTH MACFARLAND/SMITH AS A "LAO RESISTANCE LEADER" WITH WHOM THEY WERE WORKING. ACCORDING TO MARK SMITH, PHOUMANO NOSAVAN WAS TO BE PROVIDING AMMUNITION FOR THE PRÍVATE FORAY GROUP WHEN THEY ENTERED LAOS, AS WELL AS CERTAIN OTHER UNSPECIFIED SUPPORT. (VO-PW COMMENT: THERE ARE INDICATIONS IN REPORTS RECEIVED BY DIA/VO-PW THAT PHOUMANO NOSAVAN OR HIS ASSOCIATES HAVE RECEIVED MONEY FROM OTHER PRIVATE U.S. CITIZENS IN EXCHANGE FOR INFORMATION ABOUT ALLEGED U.S. PWS AND/OR MIAS IN LAOS. ALTHOUGH PHOUMANO NOSAVAN AND HIS COLLEAGUES MAY RECEIVE SOME MONEY FROM THEIR EXPLOITATION OF THE PW/MIA ISSUE, WE CANNOT RULE OUT THE POSSIBILITY THAT HIS ACTIVITIES ARE BEING MANIPULATED. BY THE LAO AND/OR VIETNAMESE SECURITY SERVICES TO FURTHER THEIR BT

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GOVERNMENT'S AGENDA ON THE PW/MIA ISSUE. PHOUMANO HAS CLEARLY PREFERRED TO DEAL WITH PRIVATE AMERICANS WHO HAVE BEEN WILLING TO PAY MONEY FOR SKELETAL REMAINS AND OTHER ARTIFACTS PURPORTEDLY ASSOCIATED WITH AMERICANS UNACCOUNTED FOR IN INDOCHINA. PHOUMANO IS WELL AWARE THE U.S. GOVERNMENT POLICY PRECLUDES ANY SUCH PAYMENTS, GIVEN THE HUMANITARIAN NATURE OF THE PW/MIA ISSUE. ALTHOUGH CLAIMING TO BE A LAO RESISTANCE LEADER, IN FACT HE HAS FEW RESOURCES TO COUNT ON AND HAS NEVER APPEARED TO BE A SIGNIFICANT FIGURE IN THE LAO RESISTANCE IN CENTRAL AND SOUTHERN LAOS. IN THE PAST, HE HAS HAD CONTACT WITH JACK BAILEY, "BO" GRITZ, AND OTHERS WHO HAVE SOUGHT PW/MIA-RELATED INFORMATION FROM PERSONS IN THAILAND.)

G. LENNY HOOD, A RESIDENT OF LEMON GROVE BETWEEN EL CAJON AND SAN DICGO, CA. LENNY CLAIMED HE IS A FORMER GREEN BERET AND HAD SERVED IN VIETNAM. LENNY AND TIM WILLIAMS WERE; TO ALL APPEARANCE, CLOSE FRIENDS UNTIL THE PRIVATE FORAY. WHEN THE TWO FINALLY HAD TO WORK TOGETHER IN THAILAND, THEY FOUND THEY HAD COMPLETELY OPPOSITE PERSONALITIES AND BEGAN TO HATE EACH OTHER. LENNY WAS AN ASSOCIATE OF DAVID VIKANDER, ANOTHER FORMER GREEN BERET WHO HAD SERVED IN VIETNAM AND WAS ALSO BILLY MARTIN'S BROTHER-IN-LAW. DAVID LEARNED ABOUT THE PRIVATE FORAY, HAD BECOME VERY UPSET AT THE ENTIRE EPISODE, AND DIRECTED HIS ANGER AT BILLY AND LENNY FOR HAVING BEEN ENTICED INTO WHAT HE VIEWED AS A "SCAM". LENNY TRAVELED TO THAILAND ON HIS U.S. PASSPORT NR. 080569669.

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4. (S/NF) UPON ARRIVAL IN THAILAND, Source STATED HE FOUND HIMSELF IN A STRANGE SITUATION. MARK SMITH AND JAMES MACFARLAND STATED TO HIM THAT "IF DIA AND THE CIA FIND OUT ABOUT THESE LIVE PWS AND WHAT WE'RE DOING TO GET THEM OUT, EVERYBODY IS GOING TO BE WAXED." FOR THE NEXT SIX MONTHS Source FOUND HIMSELF BEING MOVED FROM HOTEL TO HOTEL IN BANGKOK AND BETWEEN BANGKOK AND BOTH NAKHOM PHANOM AND UBON. WAS INITALLY ACCOMPANIED TO THAILAND BY HIS WIFE. 50 WHILE IN THAILAND, HIS WIFE BECAME DISENCHANTED WITH THE ENTIRE FORAY AND RETURNED TO THE U.S. WHERE SHE FILED PAPERS FOR SEPARATION FROM , SO WYCO. WHEN SHE RETURNED TO THE U. S., SHE WAS PROVIDED CORRESPONDENCE AND AN ENVELOPE OF UNKNOWN PHOTOGRAPHS WHICH MARK SMITH WANTED HER TO COURIER TO MARK WAPLE. AFTER RETURNING TO THE U.S., Swe INFORMED HER HUSBAND SHE HAD BEEN FOLLOWED TO THE U.S. FROM THE DATE SHE DEPARTED BANGKOK AND HER BELONGINGS HAD BEEN CHECKED CLOSELY WHEN SHE CLEARED THROUGH U.S. CUSTOMS. SHE REPORTED THAT CCRTAIN ITEMS AND/OR DOCUMENTS WERE TAKEN FROM HER BY U.S. CUSTOMS. (VO-PW COMMENT: DIA/VO-PW FIRST LEARNED OF A PRIVATE FORAY IN REF A MSG WHICH ADVISED PHOUMANO NOSAVAN WAS ATTEMPTING TO OBTAIN SUPPORT FROM PRIVATE U.S. CITIZENS. NOSAVAN WAS REPORTEDLY TRYING TO INTEREST PRIVATE U.S. CITIZENS NAMED "JACK" AND "TIM". IN RECOVERING "LIVE U.S. PWS" AND "AMERICANS MISSING-IN-ACTION" IN LAOS. DIA/VO-PW BELIEVES "JACK" MAY EQUATE TO JACK BAILEY, A FORMER U.S. AIR FORCE OFFICER WHO HAS BEEN ACTIVE PRIVATELY IN THE PW/MIA ISSUE BOTH IN THE U.S. AND IN THAILAND. DIA/VO-PW s) SP PROBABLY BEING IDENTIFIED BY PREVIOUSLY NOTED JAMES MACFARLAND AS THE COURIER FOR THE PRIVATE FORAY GROUP. Sources wife STATED HER WILLINGNESS TO DISCUSS HER ACTIVITES WITH FEDERAL AUTHORITIES.)

(S/NF) WHILE IN BANGKOK Source AND OTHERS IN THE "THE GROUP" WERE MOVED AT RANDOM TIMES FROM HOTEL TO HOTEL. MARK SMITH AND MACFARLAND APPEARED TO BE MAKING ALL THE DECISIONS AND EVERYONE ELSE WAS EXPECTED TO DO ONLY WHATEVER THEY WERE TOLD. SMITH APPEARED, IN Source's VIEW, TO BE PARANOID ABOUT SECURITY. HOTELS THE AMERICANS IN THE GROUP STAYED IN WHILE IN BANGKOK INCLUDED THE NANACONDO . WHILE AT THE NANACONDO, THE GROUP MEMBERS USED ONE OR BOTH OF ROOMS 704 AND 707. THEY ALSO STAYED AT THE WINDSOR AND THE SANUSA CUEST HOUSE. THE TWO VIETNAMESE IN THE GROUP, TAT AND TAI DO, WERE PUT INTO A HOTEL ACROSS THE STREET FROM THE NANACONDO, Source and other members of the group were often SHUTTLED TO UBON, NAKHOM PHANOM (NKP), AND MUKDAHAN WHEN MARK SMITH CLAIMED HE HAD "HOT INFORMATION" AND WAS "PREPARING TO LAUNCH." THIS KEPT HAPPENING OVER AND OVER, "PREPARING TO LAUNCH" AND THEN HAVING EVERYTHING CANCELLED. WHILE AT NKP/MUKDAHAN "THE GROUP" STAYED AT TWO DIFFERENT RESIDENCES ARRANGED BY MARK SMITH. (VO-PW COMMENT: REF B MSG ADVISED DIA/VO-PW THAT IN JUN 87 PHOUMANO NOSAVAN WAS WITH SIX AMERICANS, THREE OF WHOM RENTED A HOUSE IN MUKDAHAN, THAILAND. TWO OF THE AMERICANS WERE IDENTIFIED PHONETICALLY AS "TEEM" AND "MAC." DIA/VO-PW CONCLUDES THESE NAMES CORRELATE TO JAMES MACFARLAND AND TIM WILLIAMS, IDENTIFIED ABOVE. REF B ALSO IDENTIFIED ROSEMARY CONWAY AND "ROBERT JACK" AS WITH-MACFARLAND AT THE TIME. THESE AMERICANS WERE AT NKP IDENTIFIED IN

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CONTACT WITH MR. LOH THERAPHANT, WERE ATTEMPTING A PRIVATE FORAY INTO LAOS, AND WERE DEALING WITH ETHNIC LAO ROUTINELY CROSSING BETWEEN LAOS AND THAILAND. DIA/VO-PW HAS RECEIVED PRIOR INDICATIONS THAT LOH THERAPHANT, AN ETHNIC VIETNAMESE RESIDENT OF NKP WITH LONG TIES REPORTING INFORMATION TO THE U.S. GOVERNMENT FOR NEARLY 20 YEARS, APPEARS LINKED TO THE SOCIALIST REPUBLIC OF VIETNAM INTELLIGENCE AND SECURITY SERVICES. HE HAS OFTEN PLAYED A ROLE AS INTERMEDIARY BETWEEN PRIVATE AMERICANS SEARCHING_FOR PW/MIA INFORMATION, OFTEN IN RETURN FOR FINANCIAL REWARD OR OTHER CONSIDERATION. DIA/VO-PW BELEIVES "ROBERT JACK" MAY EQUATE TO JACK BAILEY. ROSEMARY CONWAY IS A KNOWN CLOSE ASSOCIATE OF MANY AMERICANS AND LAO NATIONALS IN SOUTHEAST ASIA. SHE HAS BEEN THE SUBJECT OF PRIOR REPORTING SINCE HER ARREST BY LAO AUTHORITIES IN VIENTIANE, LAOS IN MID-1975. SHE WAS RELEASED BY LAO COMMUNIST AUTHORITIES AFTER A BRIEF PERIOD OF DETENTION. ROSEMARY CONWAY HAS BEEN LINKED TO THIS PRIVATE FORAY GROUP IN SEPARATE REPORTING. 6. (S/NF) AFTER ARRIVING IN THAILAND, Cource; AND OTHER MEMBERS OF THE GROUP WERE SUPPORTED BY FUNDS COMING FROM BILLY MARTIN. Sourc BELIEVED THESE FUNDS AND MAIL ASSOCIATED WITH THE GROUP'S PRIVATE FORAY APPEAR TO HAVE COME THROUGH AN AMERICAN RESIDENT OF BANGKOK, J. PHILLIPS. J. PHILLIPS WAS IDENTIFIED BY MARK SMITH AS A "CLOSE ASSOCIATE" OF HIS AND HAD AN OFFICE "AROUND THE CORNER" FROM THE NANACONDO HOTEL. (VO-PW COMMENT: "J. PHILLIPS PROBABLY EQUATES TO FORMER U.S. ARMY MAJOR JACK PHILLIPS, A KNOWN ASSOCIATE OF SMITH'S WHILE IN THAILAND OVER THE PAST 3-4 YEARS.) BILLY WILLIAMS WAS OBTAINING \$2,000 TO \$4,000 AT A TIME TO SUPPORT THE GROUP'S ACTIVITES AFTER THEIR ARRIVAL IN THAILAND. WHEN Source ARRIVED HE FOUND MARK SMITH WITH TWO AMERICAN WOMEN IN THAILAND. **#**5899

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OTHER WASHINGTON, D.C. ATTORNEY BETH STEWART WHO SMITH IDENTIFIED AS HIS "GIRLFRIEND".
7. (S/NF) LATER IN THE SUMMER OF 1987 Sowre was present in the

NANACONDO HOTEL AFTER RECEIPT OF TWO THICK PACKETS OF WHAT MR. SAW WERE BLANK BANK MONEY ORDERS FROM A BANK IN DALLAS, TX. HE DID NOT NOTE THE NAME OF THE BANK. Source WAS UNSURE HOW THESE MONEY ORDERS HAD ARRIVED IN THAILAND BUT SUSPECTED THEY COULD HAVE COME THROUGH J. PHILLIPS. MARK SMITH, IN FRONT OF Source DIRECTED LENNY HOOD TO SIGN \$24.000 OF THE BLANK MONEY ORDERS WITH THE SIGNATURE OF AN INDIVIDUAL WHO MARK SMITH CLAIMED WAS ONE OF THE GROUP MEMBERS, KHAMHOU BOUTSARATH. Journe DID NOT KNOW KHAMHOU AND HAD NO KNOWLEDGE OF HIS HAVING BEEN IN THAILAND AT THIS TIME. MARK SMITH DIRECTED LENNY TO FILL OUT THE BANK MONEY ORDERS PAYABLE TO MARK WAPLE. SOUVE STATED JAMES MACFARLAND TOLD HIM. LATER THEY HAD RECEIVED A TOTAL OF \$300,000 IN BANK MONEY ORDERS TO SUPPORT THEIR OPERATION OF WHICH SMITH KEPT \$150,000. THE MONEY ORDERS WERE ALL PURPOSELY KEPT BLANK TO DISGUISE THE SOURCE OF THE MONEY AND ITS INTENDED RECIPIENTS. Source ALSO STATED MR. MACFARLAND TOLD HIM MARK SMITH OWED MARK WAPLE A "HUGE SUM OF MONEY" FOR LEGAL SERVICES WAPLE PROVIDED SMITH AND MACINTYRE GROWING OUT OF THEIR COURT SUIT AGAINST THE U.S. COVERNMENT ON THE PW/MIA ISSUE. MACFARLAND ACKNOWLEDGED THAT ALTHOUGH ALL THE MONEY WAS SUPPOSED TO HAVE GONE TO PHOUMANO NOSAVAN FOR HIS SUPPORT OF SECRET





THE GROUP'S PRIVATE FORAY, PART OF THE MONEY WAS DIVERTED AND SHIPPED TO MARK WAPLE. Source ALSO STATED MR. MACFARLAND TOLD HIM MARK SMITH WAS CONCERNED AT FIRST THAT THE BANK MONEY ORDERS WERE FAKE. HE ADVISED MACFARLAND HE HAD CHECKED WITH WAPLE WHO HAD CHECKED THE SQURCE OF THE MONEY ORDERS AND REPORTED BACK TO .. "THEY WERE ALL RIGHT" AND "COULD BE USED." SourCE STATED MACFARLAND TOLD HIM THAT "SOMEONE" WAS PREPARED TO SUBMIT A CLAIM TO THE BANK THAT THE MONEY ORDERS HAD BEEN LOST OR STOLEN AND OBTAIN REIMBURSEMENT FOR THE MONEY ORDERS GIVEN TO PHOUMANO EVEN THOUGH PHOUMANO HAD ALREADY CASHED THEM. Source STATED THE BANK MONEY ORDERS WERE VERY UNUSUAL. EACH OF THE BANK MONEY ORDERS WAS MADE OUT FOR LESS THAN \$300 AND IN STRANGE AMOUNTS SUCH AS \$280, \$295, \$296, AND OTHER AMOUNTS CLOSE TO BUT LESS THAN \$300. -Source WAS UNABLE TO DETERMINE IF THE CHECKS WERE IN NUMERICAL SEQUENCE. AT THE CHECK SIGNING, LENNY HOOD STARTED TO BECOME EXTREMELY NERVOUS AT WHAT HE WAS BEING ASKED TO DO. Source VIEWED THE DEVELOPMENT AS SOMETHING GOING FAR BEYOND WHAT HE HAD VIEWED AS A PRIVATE FORAY AND WAS NOW, IN HIS JUDGEMENT, GETTING INTO SOME TYPE OF ACTIVITIES WHICH COULD SOMEHOW BE ILLEGAL. ALTHOUGH MARK SMITH DID NOT SPECIFICALLY ADDRESS THE POINT, Source WAS LEFT WITH THE IMPRESSION THAT MARK WAPLE WOULD HAVE TO HAVE BEEN INVOLVED IN ANY POSSIBLY FRAUDULENT BANK CLAIM SINCE HE WAS THEIR U.S. BASED CONTACT POINT AND REPORTEDLY VERIFIED THE AUTHENTICITY OF THE BANK MONEY ORDERS. FROM THIS POINT ONWARD, Jowice KEPT CLOSE TRACK ON WHAT WAS HAPPENING AND CLAIMS HE ATTEMPTED TO START TO DISASSOCIATE HIMSELF FROM THE PRIVATE GROUP. ALTHOUGH BELIEVED HE UNDERSTOOD HOW THE MONEY ORDERS CAME INTO THE HANDS OF. MARK SMITH, MARK SMITH ALSO TOLD Separately the \$300,000 HAD COME FROM KHAMHOU THROUGH PHOUMANO NOSAVAN TO MARK SMITH.

MACFARLAND KNEW HOW THE MONEY HAD ARRIVED IN THAILAND AND THEY MAY HAVE BEEN ATTEMPTING TO CLOUD THE SOURCE OF THE MONEY AND THE CHANNEL BY WHICH IT ARRIVED IN BANGKOK. (VO-PW COMMENT: ON 25 SEP 86 FORMER ROYAL LAO GOVERNMENT INTELLIGENCE OFFICIAL KHAMHOU BOUSSARATH, A RESIDENT OF TEXAS, FORMALLY PUBLISHED A STATEMENT OF INTENT TO FUND HIS OWN PRIVATE RESISTANCE GROUP HE WAS FORMING AS OF THAT DATE. HE WROTE IN A PRINTED STATEMENT ABOUT HIS GROUP THAT HE WOULD PROVIDE \$300,000 ANNUALLY TO FUND OPERATIONAL ACTIVITIES OF HIS GROUP PLUS \$50,000 IN ANNUAL STAFF SUPPORT EXPENSES. THE 20 LAO PERSONALITIES SIGNING HIS DOCUMENT INCLUDED CHAO SITH NACHAMPASSACK AND RETIRED THAI GENERAL PENG MUANG FOR THE SOUTHEAST ASIAN FREEDOM ORGANIZATION.)

8. (S/NF) BY AUGUST 1987 LEARNED OF THE PLANNED BALLOON INCIDENT. IT APPEARED TO HIM THAT MARK SMITH HAD BACKED HIMSELF INTO A CORNER. IT WAS CLEAR TO SOUTH THAT MARK SMITH WAS "A WAACKO" AND "ONLY WANTED TO START WORLD WAR III." SMITH SEEMED TO HAVE EVERYBODY IN THAILAND "READY TO LAUNCH" AND JUST HAD TO DO SOMETHING AFTER SUCH A LONG DELAY. THE BALLOON LAUNCH FROM THAILAND WAS INTENDED TO COINCIDE WITH SMITH'S RETURN FROM LAOS WITH A "LIVE U.S. PW." IT APPEARED SMITH HAD TO LAUNCH "NOW" AND HE COULDN'T DELAY ANYTHING ANY LONGER.

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COMING THROUGH WITH THE SUPPORT HE HAD EARLIER PROMISED. ABOUT THIS TIME THAT TIMMY WILLIAMS AND LENNY HOOD MET AN AMERICAN NAMED GEORGE BEACH WHILE DRINKING IN THE TEXAS BAR IN BANGKOK. FROM BEACH THEY LEARNED HE (BEACH) WAS PROVIDING MILITARY TRAINING INSIDE BURMA TO A KARIN CALLED "COLONEL MARVELL" AND BEACH STATED HE HAD ACCESS TO WEAPONS AND RADIOS. GEORGE BEACH LIVED IN CHIANG MAI WITH HIS WIFE. MR. BEACH'S BUSINESS CARD GAVE HIS THAI ADDRESS AS LAUPHUM MUANG THAILAND 51000 AND TELEPHONE NR. 053561518. MR. BEACH ALSO ADVISED THE GROUP HE USED THE ALIAS WALTER GREEN AND RECEIVED MAIL AT A DIFFERENT ADDRESS FROM THE ONE ON HIS OTHER BUSINESS CARD AND AT P.O. BOX 11, KANCHANABURI, TH 7000. DURING THIS PERIOD MARK SMITH WAS IN BANGKOK, REACHED AT TELEPHONE NUMBERS 864-6888 OR 04611036. HE MENTIONED HE OFTEN RECEIVED MAIL THROUGH HIS BROTHER GREG SMITH. (VO-PW COMMENT: WAS APPROACHED BY BILL HOXIE, AN ASSOCIATE OF GEORGE BEACH, IN THE SUMMER OF 1987.BILL HOXIE HAD RETURNED FROM THAILAND AND HAD BEEN IN BURMA WITH BEACH WHO HE CLAIMED WAS PROVIDING WEAPONS/TACTICS TRAINING TO THE KACHIN/KARIN IN BURMA. THIS GOLDEN TRIANGLE AREA HAS BEEN THE SCENE OF OTHER PW/MIA REPORTING DURING 1986, COINCIDING WITH THE PERIOD OF TIME THIS PRIVATE GROUP HAS BEEN ACTIVE IN THAILAND, AND CLAIMING SHAN UNITED ARMY LEADER KHUN SA HAD ACCESS TO LIVE U.S. PWS. SUCH CLAIMS WERE LATER REFUTED BY KHUN SA.)

9. (S/NF) DURING THIS PERIOD IN THAILAND MARK SMITH WAS SENDING HIS TWO VIETNAMESE ASSOCIATES, TAI DO AND TAT, ON CERTAIN UNSPECIFIED "SECRET MISSIONS." SMITH KEPT THEM SEPARATE FROM THE OTHER AMERICANS AND NO ONE REALLY KNEW WHAT SMITH HAD ASSIGNED THEM TO DO. AT ONE POINT HAD A LONG CONVERSATION WITH MR. TAT BT

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WHO STATED THAT HE HAD ESCAPED FROM VIETNAM BUT HIS FAMILY HAD BEEN STRANDED THERE. HE STATED THAT TAI DO WAS A FORMER SOUTH VIETNAMESE ARMY CAPTAIN BUT HAD BEEN IN A MENTAL HOSPITAL. TAI DO HAD LATER FLED VIETNAM AS A BOAT PERSON. MR. TAT BRAGGED THAT HE WAS UNEMPLOYED AND WAS POSSIBLY ON WELFARE. MR. TAT PRODUCED A BANK OF AMERICA BANK BOOK SHOWING HE HAD \$40,000 ON DEPOSIT IN THE BANK. HE EXPLAINED THAT HE HAD A "SMALL BUSINESS" IN WHICH HE OBTAINED MONEY FROM VIETNAMESE IN CALIFORNIA WHO WANTED TO HAVE THEIR RELATIVES ESCAPE FROM VIETNAM. MR. TAT TOOK THEIR MONEY AND "ARRANGED SUCH THINGS." Source also learned that MR. TAT AND MR. TAI DO HAD DEPARTED THE U.S. TO JOIN THE GROUP USING TAIWANESE PASSPORTS THEY HAD "PURCHASED." THEY FIRST FLEW FROM THE U.S. TO TAIWAN, MAY HAVE BEEN DETAINED THERE BRIEFLY, AND THEN FLEW TO BANGKOK WHERE THEY JOINED THE GROUP. Source WAS NOT AWARE WHY THEY HAD FLOWN TO TAIWAN. Jouice WAS AWARE MR. TAT. NOW RETURNED TO THE U.S., WAS RESIDING OUTSIDE SAN DIEGO, CA. Source SC WAS OF THE VIEW, BASED ON HIS RELATIONSHIP WITH THE VARIOUS GROUP MEMBERS OVER THE PAST 18 MONTHS, THAT MR. TAT, MR. TAI DO, AND MR. HUNG HAD BEEN THE SPARK WHICH STARTED BILLY WILLIAMS ON HIS PW/MIA TREK AND TAT AND TAI DO APPEARED TO HAVE KNOWN MARK SMITH PRIOR TO THE BILLY WILLIAMS FIRST MEETING MARK SMITH. (VO-PW COMMENT: PREIVOUS HUMINT SOURCES HAVE LINKED ILLEGAL BOAT DEPARTURES FROM VIETNAM TO THE VIETNAMESE SECURITY SERVICES, AT TIMES FOR PRIVATE GAIN BUT ALSO REPORTEDLY LINKED TO DISPATCH OF

HOSTILE AGENTS.) 10. (S/NF) BY LATE AUG 87/EARLY SEP 87 Source WAS AT NKP AND MARK SMITH HAD MADE THE DECISION "TO LAUNCH." SOURCE WAS NEVER ABLE TO OBTAIN A COMPLETE UNDERSTANDING OF THE MISSION OF THE PRIVATE GROUP BUT HEARD FROM MARK SMITH THAT HE (SMITH) HAD REPORTING ABOUT THE PRESENCE OF TWO LIVE AMERICANS IN LAOS, ONE BLACK AND ONE CAUCASIAN. SMITH INTENDED TO ENTER LAOS TO SEARCH FOR U.S. PWS AT TWO LOCATIONS, ONE OF WHICH HE IDENTIFIED AS "CAMP APACHE." SMITH APPEARED TO CLOSELY SAFEGUARD HIS INFORMATION AND SOURCES, SPENT MOST OF HIS TIME COMPLAINING ABOUT HOW LITTLE SUPPORT HE WAS RECEIVING AND CONTEMPLATING THE PROBLEMS THEY WERE GOING TO ENCOUNTER. FINALLY, ON 5 SEP 87, Source LEARNED THAT MARK SMITH WAS "LAUNCHING." (VO-PW COMMENT: COLONEL CHIT WAS PREVIOUSLY IDENTIFIED ERRONEOUSLY IN REF C AS CHAO SITH) THE GROUP HAD LAUNCHED FROM A POINT SOUTH OF MUKDAHAN, CROSSING FROM KHEMMARAT, THAILAND, ACROSS THE MEKONG RIVER TO SAVANNAKHET PROVINCE, LAOS. ACCOMPANYING THEM, ACCORDING TO MACFARLAND, WERE REPORTEDLY 60 ARMED MEN SUPPLIED BY PHOUMANO NOSAVAN. GEORGE BEACH, FROM WHOM THE AMERICANS HAD OBTAINED AK-47 ASSAULT RIFLES, ONE GREASE GUN, AND SOME VOICE RADIOS Source BELIEVED WERE AN/PRC-10 RADIOS, LATER GOT HIS EQUIPMENT BACK PRIOR TO MARK SMITH'S LAUNCHING ACROSS THE MEKONG. AFTER LAUNCHING, SMITH GOT WORD BACK TO MACFARLAND BY COURIER THROUGH PHOUMANO HE HAD NO RADIOS AND THINGS WERE NOT GOING WELL. NOSAVAN, SOUCHIAM, HAD ENTERED LAOS WITH SEVERAL U.S. CITIZENS WHO WERE TO RENDEZVOUS AT BAN TANGVAY (WD7014) IN SAVANNAKHET PROVINCE. OTHLR REPORTS AT THE TIME SUGGESTED THE PRIVATE FORAY GROUP MAY HAVE BELIEVED THERE WERE ONE OR MORE LIVE U.S. PWS IN THE BAN TANGVAY AREA. THIS ACTIVITY WAS ASSOCIATED WITH ATTEMPTS BY PHOUMANO NOSAVAN TO LOCATE A LAO REFUGEE NAMED KHAMNOY SISONGKHAM WHO HAD PROVIDED INFORMATION PERTAINING TO PURPORTED LIVE U.S. PWS IN SAVANNAKHET PROVINCE. THE GIST OF INFORMATION ON THE REPORTED FORAY, BASED ON ALL INFORMATION THEN KNOWN TO DIA/VO-PW, WAS DISSEMINATED IN REF C. KHAMNOY SISONGKHAM HAS BEEN PREVIOUSLY IDENTIFIED BY THE STONY BEACH TEAM AS A SOURCE OF POW HEARSAY INFORMATION ASSOCIATED WITH THE PRESENCE OF 18-19 LIVE U.S. PWS IN AN AREA REFERRED TO AS PRABANG. DIA/VO-PW CONCLUDES PRABANG PROBABLY CORRELATES TO THE PHABANG REEDUCATION CAMP IN SAVANNAKHET THERE WERE NO U.S. PWS EVER DETAINED HERE. THE MOST PROVINCE. My dear Mr. Rusk:

A very sensitive source who has a background in Soviet intelligence with whom there has been insufficient contact to determine the reliability of information furnished has supplied the data set out herein. Some information furnished by the source has proven to be accurate. Due to the nature of the source, it is requested that this information be very closely held.

He learned from a Soviet Committee for State Security (KGB) representative two or three years ago that KGB had access to safes in American Embassy, Moscow, at regular intervals. The KGB representative indicated all United States sources in Moscow are KGB "plants," particularly an old man in his 60's who has been a source for many years. (5)

In response to inquiry, he stated the Powers plane was shot down by a missile with a fuse that had exploded

twenty to thirty yards from the plane. He said Soviet astronauts Gagarin and Titov were orbited by liquid fuel vehicles. According to the source, the Soviets have four more space efforts planned in the near future. These are: two two-man capsules to orbit the earth; a one-man orbit of the moon; and a flight to the moon to land equipment. Source said the Soviets have the capability to do all of this.

Source volunteered he knows Khrushchev did not want President Eisenhower to come to Moscow and initiated an incident to prevent his coming. This is true at the present time and Khrushchev does not want President Kennedy to visit Moscow. Source said Khrushchev does not want a summit meeting, "even on neutral grounds," and will go to any extent to create an incident to prevent a summit conference. In response to inquiry, source stated there will be no change in the Soviets' position on Berlin.

Additional details have been furnished to your Office of Security with request for comments that would assist in our evaluation of the above.





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

With reference to our discussion on October 29, 1952, regarding President Eisenhower's memorandum to you dated October 27, 1953, in which he refers to information from Mr. Leroy Lincoln concerning statements by Mr. Raymond P. Quinn as to a meeting between the President and a Soviet official named Shaknarov, I thought you would be interested in the following information:

Our memorandum of May 13, 1952, contained information that Raymond P. Quinn had advised that various Soviet officials, whom he refused to identify, had requested him to contact President Truman to discuss a plan for bringing the Korean situation to a satisfactory conclusion and that he had written a letter to President Truman concerning the matter but had not received a reply.

It was also set forth that Quinn stated he had gained the respect of Soviet officials over a period of years and they had told him they had no confidence in Secretary of State Acheson or other United States officials but believed Quinn could place the facts before the President. The memorandum also reflected that Quinn at that time stated Shakhnazarov was the most powerful Soviet official in the United States but that when questioned, Quinn was unable to explain how he knew this. The memorandum pointed out that so far as was known to this Bureau, Shakhnazarov held no apparent position of unusual importance in the Soviet Delegation.

The memorandum of June 3, 1953, advised that on May 28, 1953, Quinn furnished information to the effect that Shakhnazarov was willing to meet someone of importance in the United States Government to explore the possibility of arriving at a peace in Korea and the resumption of trade negotiations with the United States. The memorandum also advised of attempts by Quinn to arrange a meeting for Shakhnazarov with Francis Cardinal Spellman and Mr. Leroy Lincoln. It was stated therein that Lincoln had reportedly told Quinn he could put Quinn in touch with President Eisenhower in order to present Shakhnazarov's ideas but that Quinn had not accepted Mr. Lincoln's offer as he intended to proceed with his plans without Lincoln's intercession.

Our memorandum dated September 14, 1953, furnished additional information received from Mr. Quinn indicating that the Soviets were interested in expanding trade relations with the United States. The memorandum also set forth information from Quinn to the effect that two appointments had been made for Shakhnazarov to see Cardinal Spellman to discuss problems of permitting freedom of religion in the Soviet Union but that

Shakhnazarov had declined to accept the appointments to that date. This memorandum additionally advised that Quinn stated Shakhnazarov had told him the Soviets would be interested in purchasing the Empire State Building for business purposes if conditions developed favorably.

Subject: Proposed Heeting with ______ Soviet Official

With reference to your memoran um of October 27, 1953 referring to information from Mr. Leroy Mincoln, I now have the following, in part from J. Edgar Hoover and in part from our files.

The Soviet official in question is Abram Shakhnazarevich Shakhnazarov. He is Counselor of the Soviet Delegation to the United Nations.

in. Quinn has been for some sine trying to bring about a meeting between this Counselor and the President. In May 1952, Quinn tried to bring about a meeting with President Truman, alleging that Shalmarov was "the most powerful Noviet official in the United States". However, when questioned, Quinn was unable to explain how he know this, and so far as is known to us or the FBI, Shakmarov has no apparent position of unusual importance in the Soviet Delegation.

A year later, May 1953, Quinn tried to arrange a meeting with Shelmarov to deal sith peace in Morea and the resumption of trade negotiations with the United States. Mr. Moover reports that at that time, Lincoln told Rulnn that he could put Quinn in touch with you in order to present Shelmarov's ideas, but that Quinn preferred to try to move independently. Juinn is reported to have made two appointments for Shaknarov to see Cardinal Spellman to talk about freedom of religion in Russia, but Shakmarov declined to accept the appointments.

Quinn also stated that Shakmarov had told him that the Soviets would like to buy the Empire State Building.

I doubt that there is anything in this situation which warrants your further consideration of it.

My dear Mr. Secretary:

In my letter to you dated October 30, 1953, with reference to Mr. Leroy Lincoln's statement to President Eisenhower that a Soviet official, named "Shaknarov," was seeking a private meeting with the President, I advised that interviews with Mr. Lincoln and Mr. Raymond P. Quinn were being arranged, and that you would be furnished any information which might be received.

Mr. Lincoln was contacted on October 30, 1953, at which time he voluntarily outlined his entire association with the Soviets. He stated he first became associated with the Soviets in the early 1940's when the latter purchased the building located at 680 Park Avenue, New York City, which abuts on the residence of Lincoln, 49 East 68th Street. The building then housed the Soviet Consul General at whose invitation Lincoln visited 680 Park Avenue frequently until the Soviet United Nations Delegation took over the building. Lincoln's relations with the Soviets became less cordial and his visits to 680 Park Avenue less frequent until approximately a year ago when Quinn approached Lincoln to determine if he was interested in selling his home to the Soviets as a residence for Andrei Vishinsky.

Lincoln advised that in the course of negotiations for the sale of the house he was introduced to Abram Shakhnazarovich Shakhnazarov. You will recall

my letter of Cctober 30, 1953, indicated "Shaknarov" is the latter individual. During the negotiations Quinn told Lincoln that Shakhnazarov had indicated to Quinn a desire for the United States and the Soviet Union to work more closely together in commercial matters and to bring about peace between the two countries. At Quinn's request Lincoln volunteered to bring Quinn's request to the attention of appropriate United States Government officials. Accordingly, while in Washington, D. C., on October 26, 1953, Lincoln did bring the matter to the attention of President Eisenhower. Lincoln added that Shakhnazarov at no time has indicated to him any desire to meet with American officials and he does not know whether or not Quinn has any valid basis for his beliefs.

In the course of the interview Lincoln also mentioned that he had received an invitation from Shakhnazarov to attend a reception to be held at the Soviet Delegation Headquarters on November 6, 1953, in celebration of the anniversary of the October Revolution. Lincoln asked Shakhnazarov if other Americans would be present and was told that Secretary Dulles, Ambassador Lodge, Bernard Baruch and others had been invited. Lincoln told Shakhnazarov he would go if other Americans attended. He stated he was very interested in this reception in view of the pending sale of his residence to the Russians.

Mr. Quinn was interviewed by Bureau representatives on November 2, 1953. He furnished the background of his associations with the Soviets in real estate matters over a period of years during which time he met Shakhnazarov. He stated he considered Shakhnazarov to be a most important Soviet official. As basis for this he stated he has noticed Shakhnazarov handles real estate transactions for the Soviets and has had what Quinn termed to be high Soviet officials acting as chauffeur for him. Quinn advised that during his transactions he had endeavored to discuss peace and trade relations with

Shakhnazarov. Shakhnazarov has always indicated that the United Nations is futile and cannot achieve peace because all that is accomplished is "talk" resulting in high Soviet officials being discouraged in their hope of attaining a lasting peace.

Quinn then went on to relate information concerning his contacts with Shakhnazarov, referred to in my letter to you, dated October 30, 1953. He was questioned for specific information as to why he considered Shakhnazarov to be an important Soviet official. He recalled that while Vishinsky was being shown Lincoln's residence Shakhnazarov told Vishinsky the tour was over and that Vishinsky should leave. questioning, however, Quinn stated Shakhnazarov spoke in Russian and Vishinsky answered in the same language. Quinn admitted he could not understand Russian and had no explanation for his deduction Shakhnazarov told Vishinsky to leave, but "just knows" Shakhnazarov is the most powerful Russian he has met. He believed Shakhnazarov so powerful and well-disposed toward peace that someone in the United States Government should contact him on a casual basis and not through diplomatic channels. He would not state, however, that Shakhnazarov had asked to be put in touch with any Government official.

Quinn also revealed he had received an invitation to attend the reception on November 6, 1953, at the Soviet Delegation Headquarters. He stated he hoped to attend the reception and possibly meet Secretary of State Dulles at which time he would casually bring up the whole matter and ask Secretary Dulles to discuss it with Shakhnazarov then and there. He then indicated, however, that if he did attend the reception he would not in all probability proceed in such manner.

Quinn was unable to furnish any information in addition to that previously noted and it was not

possible to obtain specific information from Quinn indicating any part of his story was based on a request from Shakhnazarov rather than Quinn's own desire to initiate proceedings between the Soviets and the United States Government.

Your message of November 2, 1953, advising you did not feel it necessary to pursue this matter any further has been furnished to me. Accordingly, no further action will be taken by this Bureau.

Alleged Planned Series of Revolts in Nicaragua, Honduras and Dominican Republic

Reference is made to previous SY memoranda concerning the activities of the Caribbean Legion.

This Division has now been advised by a confidential source within the Government that according to an informant of unknown reliability and allegedly close to the leaders of the Caribbean Legion and the Venezdelan Democratic action Group (Accion Democratica Venezolana, ADV), the leaders of the foregoing groups held a secret meeting in Habana, Cuba approximately three weeks ago. According to the informant Jose Figueres was named Commander-in-Chief of the Caribbean Legion and Juan Bosch and Eufemio Fernandez were named as his deputies. The Cuban Minister of Public Health was alleged to have attended the meeting representing the interests of the Cuban Government. His name, however, was not furnished. (Ranning Corrier)

It is alleged that the groups plan to incite a revolution in Nicaragua for the purpose of ousting General Anastasio Somoza and his regime now that President Victor Roman y Reyes is in the United States for medical treatment. If the Nicaraguan revolution proves successful, a movement will then be attempted against Venezuela between the third week of May and the first week of June 1950. Venezuela will be attacked from the North by the Carrobean Degion and from the South by the Venezuelan Democratic Action Group ()

The informant further reported that, following the above invasion, an attack will be made on the Dominican Republic, using Venezuela as a base ()

According to this informant, planes, arms, and ammunition are reportedly , being obtained in the United States for both groups by Jessie L. Vickers of Miami, Florida; one Clark, who is allegedly the president of an insurance company in Atlanta, Georgia; J. Wilson Brown; and the Drake Shipping Company, It is to be noted that J. Wilson Brown is the Mexican representative of the Drake Shipping Company, a New York City concern. (L)

It has been further alleged by this informant that arms are being obtained in Mexico by J. Wilson Brown and the Costa Rican and Guatemalan Ambassadors to Mexico and the Cuban Government.

Alleged Planned Series of Revolts in Micarague, Honduras and the Dominican Republic (W)

Reference is made to previous SY memoranda entitled, "Alleged Planned Series of Revolts in Micaragua, Honduras and the Dominican Republic", (4)

This Division has now been informed by the Federal Bureau of Investigation that on April 1, 1950, Angel F. Morales and Juan Isidro Jimenez-Grullon, Dominican Revolutionaries arrived in Mashington, D. C., and registered at the Hotel Washington. It was ascertained that their purpose for coming to the United States was to testify before the Organization of American States (OAS). It was further alleged that they planned to contact Revolutionary leaders in Mew York City. (4)

After their arrival in Washington, it was ascertained that both Morales and Grullon were in almost constant company with Jose Horacio Rodriguez, a leader of the Caribbean Legion who was also registered at the Hotel Washington, Rodriguez came to the United States from Havana, Cuba. (4)

According to a source considered reliable by the Bureau, it was ascer- (💪) tained that Morales and Grullon came to Washington for a three fold purpose

- 1. To sit as observers at sessions of the Organization of American States.
- To attempt to influence delegates to the Organization of American States against the Trujillo Government of the Dominican Republic.
- 3. To furnish information to the Press in the United States concerning Trujillo's regime.

The source advised that Jose Horacio Rodriguez is the son of General Carlos Rodriguez who allegedly financed and organized the abortive invasion of the Dominican Republic in November 1947 from Cayo Confites, Cuba. According to the source Jose Horacio Rodriguez has prepared a paper on the "Rights of Men" which he indicated he plans to release in the United States as argument against the Trujillo Government. The source was unable to state, however, when and where this document would be released. (4)

Later the source ascertained that Morales and Grullon had allegedly received a letter originating from a high official in the Dominican Foreign Office who is anti-Trujillo. This letter is alleged to have disclosed that between March 26, 1950 through March 31, 1950, Trujillo made the following disbursements: (u)

\$100,000

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- (u)
- 1. \$100,000 to an Alexander Kovacs described as a Hungarian who directs an arms factory in Cuidad Trujillo, Dominican Republic.

 The transaction was believed to have taken place in Switzerland.
- 2. \$32,000 to an aviation surplus broker in New York City, (name not furnished).
- 3. \$72,000 to a Raymond S. Esmeralda described as an aviation broker who might be located in New York City.
- 4. \$3,000 to a Clara A. Livingston who is alleged to operate a small airport at El Dorado, Puerto Rico.

The same source stated the letter is alleged to have stated that within the next few weeks, Trujillo plans to take a number of Dominicans or Haitians, most likely Dominicans, and outfit them with uniforms of the Haitian Army. They will also be equipped with Haitian arms and ammunition. These men will then be transported across the border to Haiti where they will then simulate an invasion of the Dominican Republic. When this force enters the Dominican Republic they will be met by Dominican troops and a number will be killed following which the Dominican Republic might do one of the following:

- l. Invoke the Rio Mutual Defense Treaty claiming Haiti to be an aggressor. Trujillo will then claim that since Haiti was "white-washed" by the Fact Finding Committee of the Organization of American States, the Haitians became over confident and believed they could "get away" with such an attempt.
- 2. "In self defense" Dominican troops will invade Haiti and overthrow the present Haitian Government and install Colonel Astrel Roland as President of the Haitian Republic. Trujillo will then present the Organization of American States with a fait accompli on the grounds of "self defense".

The source further stated that Morales and Grullon claimed that Trujillo had recently purchased quantities of small incendiary bombs from an unidentified source. It was the source's understanding that this information was being made available to the Haitian Ambassador and Foreign Minister who in turn would alert President Estime in Port Au Prince. The source further stated that the information would be furnished the U.S. Department of State.

Continuing the source stated that both Morales and Grullon had indicated a desire to talk with Romulo Betancourt, former President of Venezuela, now residing in Washington, D. C. as a political exile. The source added



that

that Morales is one of the original organizers of the Caribbean Legion.

On April 5, 1950, Morales and Grullon were observed in company with Albert C. Hicks, 69 Horatio Street, New York City, who was also registered at the Hotel Washington, Washington, D. C. Hicks may be identical with the Albert C. Hicks, author of the book "Blood on the Streets" which exposed Trujillo as a dictator in Santo Domingo. He also may possibly be identical with the Albert C. Hicks who wrote an article for the "Nation" entitled "Election Day in Santo Domingo" in an issue prior to June 26, 1947. However, from information now available, it cannot definitely be determined if these individuals are identical The Consul General of the Dominican Republic was reported to have sent a letter of protest to the "Nation".

The foregoing data has been forwarded with the request by the Bureau that it not be disseminated outside the Department. The Department of the Army and the Department of the Air Force has been informed of this report by the Bureau.

Charge of Forthcoming Dominican Action Against Haiti

The attached memorandum from SY reports on the activities of Dominican exiles Angel F. Morales, Juan Isidro Jimenez-Grullon, and Jose Horacio Rodriguez while they were in Washington during the OAS consideration of the Caribbean situation. Of particular interest is the inclusion of a report similar to that we had received from the Haitian Ambassador regarding Trujillo's plans to create a border incident which would be publicized by him as Haitian aggression against the Dominican Republic. According to the attached memorandum this report conveyed to the FBI from "a source considered reliable" who stated that Morales and Jimenez-Grullon had learned of it from a letter originating from a high Dominican Foreign Office official who is anti-Trujille,(w)

It is interesting to speculate whether the immediate source of the information conveyed to us by Ambassador Charles was identical with the FBI source, was the aforementioned Dominican exiles, or was the supposed high anti-Trujillo official in the Dominican Foreign Office. pertinent part of the attached FBI memorandum is marked on page 2.

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A confidential source within the Government has advised that the following information concerning General Santiago Pina Soria, aide to President Aleman of Mexico, was furnished by a reliable source.

General Pina Soria attended the inauguration of President Jacobo Arbenz of Guatemala as a representative of the Mexican Government. While in Guatemala City, General Pina Soria allegedly met with certain other unidentified individuals at the home of a Guatemalan general and there a secret session of a political nature was held. As a result of the session, an informal understanding was allegedly reached whereby the Guatemalan and Mexican administrations will attempt to work more closely together with greater cooperation and mutual understanding. It was further alleged that the Guatemalan Government was able to interest the Mexican administration in the overthrow of General Anastasio Somoza of Nicaragua。 General Pina Soria was alleged to have given assurances that Rogerio De La Selva, private secretary of President Aleman of Mexico, and Fernando Casas Aleman, Governor of the Federal District of Mexico, would back up the agreements consented to by Pina Soria. (4)

It was further alleged that a general policy was agreed upon at this meeting. The policy was stated to be of a long-term nature based upon the theory that the United States must be permitted to weaken itself by an extended and extenuating war in Asia. It was indicated that as the United States continues to weaken itself through world-wide military commitments, Mexico and Guatemala, along with Argentina, will endeavor to work with such a mutuality of effort that their bargaining power with the United States will become greatly increased. It was indicated that in forming this Latin American bloc, they also hope to count upon the assistance of certain elements in Venezuela. It was further indicated that this group hopes that the bloc may be able to grow in strength to the point that in future hemispheric diplomatic conferences the bloc of nations will have greatly increased their bargaining power. (4)

The source added that the general attitudes taken by the Mexican, Guatemalan and Argentine Governments at the recent Foreign Ministers: Conference in Washington, D. C. would tend to confirm the general theory of the information as set out above.

Reference is made to my memorandum of May 18 concerning subject. A confidential source within the Government has reported that a reliable source advised that while in Boston Jose Figueres received word from Romulo Betancourt that President Prio of Cuba desired to see him. Betancourt allegedly urged Figueres to proceed to Habana at once, but subject did not reach Habana until April 28, 1951. (4)

It has also been reported that former President Arevalo of Guatemala was then visiting in Havana as an official guest of the Cuban Government. According to the source, on April 28, 1951 Arevalo, accompanied by President Prio and General Ruperto Cabrera, Chief of Staff of the Cuban Army, proceeded by automobile to a rural retreat of President Prio's known as "La Altura". There they were joined by Betancourt, Figueres and Aureliano Sanchez Arango, Cuban Minister of Education and a close friend of Figueres. The source added that the group spent the weekend at "La Altura". (4)

The source further advised that several days later a similar meeting was held at the rural farm owned by Miguel Angel Quevedo, director of the weekly magazine, Bohemia, which is published in Havana. The May 6, 1951 issue of Bohemia carried several pictures of the aforementioned individuals at the above-referred to farm. It appears that in addition to Betancourt. Figueres, Arevalo, Quevedo and several Guatemalan military men who had accompanied Arevalo on his visit to Cuba, there was also present Eufemio Fernandez Ortega, former Chief of the Cuban Secret Police, a chose friend of President Prio and well known as a leader of the Caribbean Lagien. The Bohemia article stated the occasion of the meeting was a luncheon in honor of Arevalo, Figueres and Betancourt, and was held on Monday, April 30, 1951. Arevalo reportedly departed from Cuba for Guatemala on May 3, 1951, (W)

In my memorandum of May 18, you were advised that Figueres had an appointment on April 10 with Thomas Mann, the author. It has since been reported that the appointment was not with the author, but with Thomas C. Mann of the Department.

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
