Re: Request for PBGC's Memo on Actuarial Impact on COVID-19

I am responding to your Freedom of Information Act (FOIA) request to the Disclosure Division of the Pension Benefit Guaranty Corporation (PBGC), which was submitted, via FOIAonline, on September 28, 2021. You requested a copy of each memo, report, assessment, technical analysis, financial analysis, white paper, or actuarial document discussing the actuarial impact/effect of COVID-19 (including reductions in lifespan and deaths) on pensions or pension risks or pension holdings, during the timeframe March 2020 through the present only. You authorized fees in the amount of \$35.00. We processed your request in accordance with the FOIA, and the PBGC's implementing regulation.

Pursuant to your request, we conducted a search of agency records and located approximately 29 pages of responsive documents and one excel spreadsheet. I have determined that 3 pages and one excel spreadsheet may be released to you in part as follows:

- 1) Annuitant DODs to Annuitant per Month, dated March 4, 2021 (1 page);
- 2) PBGC Annuitant Death rates 2017 through 2020, dated March 16, 2021 (1 page);
- 3) PBGC Annuitant Death Rates Comparison for dates 2017-2020 (1 page); and
- 4) PBGC Annuitant Deaths to total Annuitants Per Month Excel Spreadsheet.

I have determined that it was necessary to fully withhold 26 pages and portions of the above-referenced records from disclosure. The PBGC reasonably foresees that the disclosure of this information would harm interests protected by the FOIA. I have relied on two FOIA Exemptions to withhold this information.

The first applicable exemption, 5 U.S.C. § 552(b)(5), deals with internal documents: interagency or intra-agency memoranda or letters consisting of judgments, opinions, advice or recommendations which would not be available by law to a party other than an agency in litigation with the PBGC and as such are not required to be disclosed under 5 U.S.C. § 552(b)(5). Attorney client communications and information including the agency's deliberative processes

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are protected by this exemption. The Disclosure Officer has determined the disclosure of this material would not further the public interest at this time and would impede the operations of the PBGC.

The second applicable exemption, 5 U.S.C. § 552(b)(6), exempts from required public disclosure, "personnel and medical files and similar files the disclosure of which would constitute a clearly unwarranted invasion of personal privacy." Some of the records you have requested contain "similar files" within the meaning of the above cited statutory language and PBGC's implementing regulation (29 C.F.R. § 4901.21(b)(4)). In applying Exemption 6, a balancing test was conducted, weighing the privacy interests of the individuals named in a document against the public interest in disclosure of the information. The public interest in disclosure is one that "sheds light on an agency's performance of its statutory duties." *Dep't of Justice v. Reporters Committee*, 489 U.S. 749, 773 (1989). The Disclosure Officer has determined disclosure of this information would constitute a clearly unwarranted invasion of an individual's personal privacy.

Since this decision constitutes a partial denial of records request, I am providing you your administrative appeal rights in the event you wish to avail yourself of this process. The FOIA provides at 5 U.S.C. § 552(a)(6)(A)(i) (2014) amended by FOIA Improvement Act of 2016, Pub. L. No. 114-185, 130 Stat. 538 that if a disclosure request is denied in whole or in part by the Disclosure Officer, the requester may file a written appeal within 90 days from the date of the denial or, if later (in the case of a partial denial), 90 days from the date the requester receives the disclosed material. The PBGC's FOIA regulation provides at 29 C.F.R. § 4901.15 (2017) that the appeal shall state the grounds for appeal and any supporting statements or arguments, and shall be addressed to the General Counsel, Attention: Disclosure Division, Pension Benefit Guaranty Corporation, 1200 K Street, N.W., Washington, D.C. 20005. To expedite processing, the words "FOIA Appeal" should appear on the letter and prominently on the envelope.

In the alternative, you may contact the Disclosure Division's Public Liaison at 202-326-4040 for further assistance and to discuss any aspect of your request. You also have the option to contact the Office of Government Information Services (OGIS) at the National Archives and Records Administration to inquire about the FOIA mediation services they offer. This completes the processing of your request. Your request was categorized as "Other." Under this category requesters are assessed search and duplication costs. Since processing costs were assessed below our nominal fee of \$25.00, I have not charged fees for processing this request.

² The FOIA Improvement Act of 2016 precludes an agency from charging search fees to a FOIA requester if the agency does not meet the FOIA's twenty-day time limit. As such, we did not assess search fees for this request.



Attached is a chart that illustrates, at least indirectly, the effects of COVID on our annuitant population. It looks at the rate of deaths per 1000 annuitants for each of the past 4 years. And for comparison, it shows the total number of USA deaths (all causes) for 2020. You can see that our 2020 annuitant deaths follow the same curve as the total USA deaths, and our 2020 death rate is substantially higher than each of the 3 prior years. Looking at the raw numbers, we had about 8 to 9 thousand more deaths during calendar year 2020 than we typically experience.

The PBGC Annuitant Death Rates are based on total annuitant and total annuitant death counts per month queried from PBGC's payment database Spectrum. The rates are a ratio of total annuitant deaths over total annuitants per month (per 1000 annuitants).


PBGC Annuitant Deaths to Total Annuitants Per Month
