This letter responds to your Freedom of Information Act (FOIA) request for "a copy of the listing of FCC Office of Inspector General investigations (not audits) closed during calendar years 2021 and 2022, to include fields such as the case number, the date the investigation was closed, the title or subject of the investigation, the category or type of investigation, etc." from the FCC Office of Inspector General (OIG). Your request has been assigned FOIA Control No. 2023-000198.

FCC OIG searched for responsive records. We located one, one-page record responsive to your request and it is enclosed. Some material on the page produced has been redacted for the reasons discussed below.

The Record responsive to your request was redacted under FOIA Exemption 6.<sup>1</sup> Exemption 6 protects "personnel and medical files and similar files the disclosure of which would constitute a clearly unwarranted invasion of personal privacy." Balancing the public's right to disclosure against the individual's right to privacy, we have determined that release of this information would constitute a clearly unwarranted invasion of personal privacy. The redacted information includes the name and personally identifying information of an individuals who were the subject of an investigation. We have determined it is reasonably foreseeable disclosure would harm the privacy interest of the person mentioned in these records, which Exemption 6 is intended to protect.

The Record responsive to your request was redacted under Exemption 7(C), which protects "records or information compiled for law enforcement purposes [the production of which] could reasonably be expected to constitute an unwarranted invasion of personal privacy."<sup>2</sup> Balancing the public's right to disclosure against the individual's right to privacy, we have determined that release of this information would constitute an unwarranted invasion of personal privacy. The redacted information includes the names and personally identifying information of individuals who were subject to investigation. These names were compiled during the course of an investigation and in instances such as this, the balance favors not releasing these names. We have determined it is reasonably foreseeable disclosure would harm the FCC OIG or the Federal government's law enforcement activities, which Exemption 7 is intended to protect.

The FOIA requires that "any reasonably segregable portion of a record" must be released after appropriate application of the Act's exemptions.<sup>3</sup> The statutory standard requires the release of any portion of a record that is nonexempt and that is "reasonably segregable" from the exempt portion. However, when nonexempt information is "inextricably intertwined" with exempt information, reasonable segregation is not possible.<sup>4</sup> The redactions and/or withholdings made are consistent with our responsibility to determine if any segregable portions can be released. To the extent non-exempt material is not released, it is inextricably intertwined with exempt material.

We also reviewed the withheld or redacted record(s) to determine if discretionary release is appropriate.<sup>5</sup> The materials protected from disclosure under Exemption 6 are not appropriate for discretionary release in light of the personal privacy interests involved. The materials protected from disclosure under Exemption 7 are not appropriate for discretionary release in light of the law enforcement sensitivities involved.

We are required by both the FOIA and the Commission's own rules to charge requesters certain fees associated with the costs of searching for, reviewing, and duplicating the sought after information.<sup>6</sup> To calculate the appropriate fee, requesters are classified as: (1) commercial use requesters; (2) educational requesters, non-commercial scientific organizations, or representatives of the news media; or (3) all other requesters.<sup>7</sup>

Pursuant to section 0.466(a)(8) of the Commission's rules, you have been classified for fee purposes under category (3) as an "all other requester."<sup>8</sup> As an "all other requester," the Commission assesses charges to recover the full, reasonable direct cost of searching for and reproducing records that are responsive to the request; however, you are entitled to be furnished with the first 100 pages of reproduction and the first two hours of search time without charge under section 0.470(a)(3)(i) of the Commission's rules.<sup>9</sup> The production in response to your request required fewer than two hours of search time, and was provided in electronic form. Therefore, you will not be charged any fees.

You may seek review by filing an application for review with the Office of General Counsel. An application for review must be *received* by the Commission within 90 calendar days of the date of this letter.<sup>10</sup> You may file an application for review by mailing the application to Federal Communications Commission, Office of General Counsel, 45 L Street NE, Washington, DC 20554, or you may file your application for review electronically by e-mailing it to FOIA-Appeal@fcc.gov. Please caption the envelope (or subject line, if via e-mail) and the application itself as "Review of Freedom of Information Action."
