This letter is to acknowledge receipt of your Freedom of Information Act (FOIA) request dated September 28, 2022. Your request was received in the BIE FOIA office on September 28, 2022 and assigned FOIA case number DOI-BIE-2022-006359. Please refer to this number in any future correspondence concerning this FOIA request.

You requested the following information:

A copy of the 20 most recent “Week Ahead” Reports (reports to the Secretary) at BIE.

We have enclosed one final PDF document consisting of 180 pages, which is being released to you with redactions on five different pages. These redactions have been made pursuant to exemptions 5 and 6 of the Freedom of Information Act, 5 U.S.C. § 552.

FOIA exemption 5 allows an agency to withhold “inter-agency or intra-agency memorandums or letters that would not be available by law to a party other than an agency in litigation with the agency, provided that the deliberative process privilege shall not apply to records created 25 years or more before the date on which the records were requested.” *See* 5 U.S.C. § 552(b)(6) The information that has been withheld under exemption 5 consists of intra-agency discussion regarding the formation of a policy position.

FOIA exemption 6 allows an agency to withhold “personnel and medical files and similar files the disclosure of which would constitute a clearly unwarranted invasion of personal privacy.” *See* 5 U.S.C. § 552(b)(6). The information that has been withheld under exemption 6 consists of confidential personal information (HIPAA) and we have determined that the individuals to whom this information pertains have a substantial privacy interest in withholding it.



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The phrase “similar files” covers any agency records containing information about a particular individual that can be identified as applying to that individual. To determine whether releasing records containing information about a particular individual would constitute a clearly unwarranted invasion of personal privacy, we are required to balance the privacy interest that would be affected by disclosure against any public interest in the information.

Because the harm to personal privacy is greater than whatever public interest may be served by disclosure, release of the information would constitute a clearly unwarranted invasion of the privacy of these individuals and we are withholding it under exemption 6.

We withheld one document consisting of 94 pages as we reasonably foresee that disclosure of this record would be prohibited by law under exemption 3 which allows the withholding of information prohibited from disclosure by another federal statute provided that either the statute, “(A) requires that matters be withheld from the public in such a manner as to leave no discretion on the issue, or (B) establishes particular criteria for withholding or refers to particular types of matters to be withheld.” 5 U.S.C. § 552(b)(3). Therefore, pursuant to 41 U.S.C. § 4702, this material will not be released.

Under the FOIA, the only relevant public interest to consider under the exemption is the extent to which the information sought would shed light on an agency’s performance of its statutory duties or otherwise let citizens “know what their government is up to.” The burden is on the requester to establish that disclosure would serve the public interest. When the privacy interest at stake and the public interest in disclosure have been determined, the two competing interests must be weighed against one another to determine which is the greater result of disclosure: the harm to personal privacy or the benefit to the public. The purposes for which the request for information is made do not impact this balancing test, as a release of information requested under the FOIA constitutes a release to the general public.

Right to Appeal

- Turtle Mountain (TM) schools: Due to an increase in COVID-19 cases on the reservation, the Turtle Mountain Tribal Council closed all BIE schools for in-person and virtual learning. BIE's Belcourt Education Program Administrator is working with the North Dakota State Superintendent to arrange for TM students to be included in the State's virtual learning system. Currently, TM schools are operated cooperatively with State and in the past did not join the virtual system.

- Regulatory Blanket Waiver: BIE has submitted for approval a waiver of its average daily membership (ADM). The ADM is the aggregated Indian Student Equalization Program (ISEP)-eligible membership of a school for a school year, divided by the number of school days in the school's submitted calendar. BIE calculated the ADM for schools that had an increase in enrollments and provided funding to the schools using ISEP contingency funds. The DOI Secretary must reserve 1 percent of funds from the Indian Student Equalization Formula (ISEF) allotment formula to meet emergencies and unforeseen contingencies affecting educational programs.
- On March 9 and 10, the BIE Advisory Board for Exceptional Children will host virtual meetings for Advisory Board members and the public. The Board will receive presentations from BIE program offices and use to formulate their priorities for school year 2022-2023. As a recipient of funds from the Individuals with Disabilities Education Improvement Act of 2004, Public Law 108-446, Section 612(a)(21), from the U.S. Department of Education, Office of Special Education Programs, the BIE is required "to establish and maintain an advisory panel for the purpose of providing policy guidance with respect to special education and related services for children with disabilities in the state." Specific responsibilities of the Board are outlined in Section 612(a)(21) of the Act.

- **Surgical face masks:** BIE has ordered 600,000 surgical face masks to distribute to all BIE staff and students, and to all BIE employees, including employees at Southwestern Indian Polytechnic Institute (SIPI) and Haskell University Indian Nations (HINU). Each student, staff, and employee will receive 10 surgical masks. BIE has also ordered 600,000 N95 respirators to distribute to BIE student families, they are not intended for students. N95 respirators are typically worn by healthcare workers and can add even more protection but must fit and be worn correctly to be effective and should not be used if they impede breathing. BIE will be distributing the surgical masks and N95 respirators for staff and families through postal services or in-person delivery in the coming weeks as they become available.
- **Hazardous Duty Pay:** BIE is requesting approval of Hazardous Duty Pay for BIE staff, both General Schedule (GS) and wage grade (WG) at Southwestern Indian Polytechnic Institute (SIPI) and Haskell Indian Nations University (HINU). Specifically, BIE is seeking hazardous duty pay for personnel performing the following functions: Residential, Custodial, Food Service, Security, Academic, and Facilities, or are engaged in provision of in-person instruction or interaction with students, or other face-to-face in-person activities with staff or the public. Such payments would be limited to the times during which the respective staff are involved in providing such services on-site at their assigned duty station. These payments would not be made during times when employees are teleworking or when services are not being rendered in-person with students or the public, such as, but not limited to, Spring or Summer Break.

- **Isleta Retrocession:** BIE personnel were verbally informed by the school board President that the Tribe no longer wishes to pursue a retrocession of the school to BIE. The reasoning provided was the Tribe's desire to retain all current staff members in their present positions. Per applicable statute and regulation, to execute a retrocession all current Tribal school employees are required to reapply for their positions as federal employees. The BIE has requested that the Tribe issue a formal Tribal resolution in order to halt the ongoing retrocession effort.

- **COVID Test Kits Distribution:** BIE School Operations is coordinating the distribution of over 500,000 COVID-19 antigen test kits for all BIE students, families, staff, and all BIE employees, including Southwestern Indian Polytechnic Institute (SIPI) and Haskell Indian Nations University (HINU). From February 11 thru March, 11, 2022, schools and BIE employees will receive a shipment of COVID-19 test kits, roughly 8 test kits per student, staff, and employee. This distribution supplements previous efforts in securing Personal Protective Equipment (PPE) to support a safe learning environment for our students, staff, and BIE employees.
- **Hazardous Duty Pay:** BIE is requesting approval of Hazardous Duty Pay for BIE staff, both General Schedule (GS) and wage grade (WG) at Southwestern Indian Polytechnic Institute (SIPI) and Haskell Indian Nations University (HINU). - Director Dearman will provide in-person staffing support to AS-IA with next week’s Tribal meetings with Hopi and Havasupai. BIE will provide AS-IA with talking points regarding the Hopi consolidation process, as well as ongoing efforts to address systemic challenges at Havasupai.
- Blackfeet Tribal senior citizen center construction project: Belcourt, North Dakota, BIE operated Education Program Administrator (EPA) met with a member of the United States Air Force Air National Guard (National Guard). National Guard representative communicated that it is the Blackfeet Tribe’s desire to contract with Bureau of Indian Affairs/BIE to use the BIE Operated Blackfeet Boarding Dormitory from June thru September 2022. The purpose of the contracting would be to provide sleeping quarters and dining facilities for participants in the Tribal construction project of a senior citizen center in Heart Butte, MT. EPA will coordinate with BIA to determine if the use is allowable.
- Indian Health Service (IHS) N95 masks: IHS is in the process of sending one million N95 masks to BIE. BIE will distribute this new supply of N95 respirators to all bureau-funded schools for use by adult students and staff. BIE’s School Operations will coordinate the distribution.
- Ventilation Assessments: BIE Branch of Facility Management (BFM) staff conducted assessments for 100% of BIE-funded schools. BFM staff continue to contact schools listed as “Priority” on the Ventilation Assessments list, shown below, to ensure schools are taking action on recommendations and interim measures. BFM is also providing technical assistance to school facility managers to enter Deferred Maintenance (DM) work orders for project-based actions above the \$2500 threshold. The DM work orders require a scope of work, government estimate, and cost estimates to be entered into Maximo and approved by Central Office for funding. Once funded, the DM work order can be developed into individual projects. BFM is also working to create Minor Improvement & Repair (MI&R) DM work orders from the ventilation reports that will increase the overall amount of work order dollars shown in the below table.

Bureau of Indian Education (BIE) Director Tony Dearman has no media interviews, hearings or travel scheduled during this time period. Director Dearman and BIE continue to hold meetings to advance work on BIE's mental health contract; distance learning leadership team coordination; coordinating with Indian Health Service (IHS) on vaccine distribution to BIE schools/employees; Tribal Colleges and Universities funding equity, and school reopening plans.

The Director continues to participate in weekly Education Program Administrator (EPA) calls with their respective schools to receive school updates and concerns directly from the local level as the BIE works to continually improve its communications and services. Director Dearman is meeting with individual principals and school leaders to understand the issues facing their students, staff and Tribal communities, particularly as they work to serve during the pandemic.

Upcoming Bureau Priority Communications (March 10 – March 22)

Dr. Sherry Allison, Southwestern Indian Polytechnic Institute (SIPI) President, will retire after 20 years of service in early April. BIE is currently recruiting for the President position and BIE Human Resources (HR) will advertise for a short-term detail for an Acting President to provide coverage until the position is filled. While this occurs, HR will continue to monitor the number of potentially qualified applicants and the level of their qualifications. If the number of applicants is not sufficient, the advertisement will be extended until there is a applicant pool of qualified candidates for the position. The SIPI Board of Regents has requested to meet with the BIE Director and HR on March 29 regarding the position vacancy. BIE is also working with the Department ERB regarding transitioning the position to and SES position considering their organizational supervision.

Grants, Financial Awards, and Contracts (March 10 – March 22)

BIE School Operations Budget Office continues to monitor Every Student Succeeds Act (ESSA) grants and BIE regulatory funding balances to obligate available balances to BIE-funded schools. BIE Associate Deputy Director-Bureau Operated Schools (ADD-BOS) met with Cheyenne River Sioux Tribal Leaders related to updating the Cheyenne River Sioux Cooperative Agreement for the 2021-2022 School Year. The Tribe requested to share their concerns and review the document with BIE before reaching out to the district. BIE ADD-BOS will meet with the Tribe on March 12 to discuss Agreement details. The Agreement amongst the Tribe, BIE, and the school district focuses on collaboration and coordination of education services.

ONGOING ITEMS

The BIE Division of Performance & Accountability (DPA) supports BIE schools receiving formula and discretionary grants from the ED. Numerous technical assistance presentations, including grant fiscal and programmatic implementation are provided by DPA staff on content expertise, evidence-based tools and resources, and direct support to effectively address grantee needs and assist with implementation of federal programs across key program areas under the Every Student Succeeds Act of 2015 (ESSA) and the Individuals with Disabilities Education Act of 2004 (IDEA).

Through this work, DPA is dedicated to improving results for students with disabilities. DPA is working with BIE Associate Deputy Directors (ADD), Education Program Administrators (EPAP), Education Resource Center (ERC) staff, school administrators and staff, related services providers, and parents of children with disabilities to provide monthly universal technical assistance webinars that provide information regarding relevant special education topics, activities, and upcoming monthly webinars. The universal technical assistance webinars have been widely attended and DPA has received positive feedback from all participants regarding their subject matter expertise and DPA’s communication and collaboration. The following schools and/or Tribes have requested technical assistance to waive or submitted formal requests to waive the BIE’s first-ever Standards, Assessments and Accountability System (SAAS) or individual assessments for English Language Arts/Math, Science, Alternate, and English Language Proficiency. BIE is evaluating each request and working with ED for their review. BIE leadership had originally hoped the single system – as compared to the BIE’s former 23-state system based on the State where BIE schools are located – would improve data tracking and tailored support to schools. However, numerous Tribal governments are now requesting to waive the BIE’s unified system in part or in whole. BIE SAAS waivers must meet the requirements of section 1111 of the Elementary and Secondary Education Act (ESEA) of 1965, as amended by the Every Student Succeeds Act (ESSA), Public Law 114-95, enacted December 10, 2015, and be approved by the Secretary of the Interior and the Secretary of Education.

- **US Department of Education Native Language Listening Session:** On March 17, the U.S. Department of Education (ED) will host a listening session on Native languages. ED invited BIE to partner and representatives from the BIE's Office of Sovereignty in Indian Education will participate on behalf of the BIE.
- **New Mexico Department of Health Providing Bureau-funded Schools COVID Rapid Test Kits:** The New Mexico Department of Health (NMDOH) is providing Bureau funded schools in New Mexico COVID Test Kits to use upon return from spring break.
- **BIE and Indian Health Services (IHS) Partner to Provide Pine Ridge School Counseling Services:** The BIE and IHS are partnering to continue to provide counseling services to Pine Ridge School, with IHS deploying five counselors to the Pine Ridge Reservation and dedicating one counselor to work directly with the school.

- **Blackfeet Tribal senior citizen center construction project:** Belcourt, North Dakota, BIE operated Education Program Administrator (EPA) met with a member of the United States Air Force Air National Guard (National Guard). National Guard representative communicated that it is the Blackfeet Tribe's desire to contract with Bureau of Indian

Affairs/BIE to use the BIE Operated Blackfeet Boarding Dormitory from June thru September 2022. The purpose of the contracting would be to provide sleeping quarters and dining facilities for participants in the Tribal construction project of a senior citizen center in Heart Butte, MT. EPA will coordinate with BIA to determine if the use is allowable.

- **Indian Health Service (IHS) N95 Masks and COVID-19 Test Kits:** For the month of February, BIE’s School Operations Team distributed over a million N95 masks to BIE Schools. This month, the BIE will distribute 500,000 COVID-19 Test Kits and another 1 million N95 masks, provided by IHS, to all Bureau-funded schools for use by adults, students and staff.
- **Ventilation Assessments:** BIE Branch of Facility Management (BFM) staff conducted assessments for 100% of BIE-funded schools. BFM staff continue to contact schools listed as “Priority” on the Ventilation Assessments list, shown below, to ensure schools are taking action on recommendations and interim measures. BFM is also providing technical assistance to school facility managers to enter Deferred Maintenance (DM) work orders for project-based actions above the \$2500 threshold. The DM work orders require a scope of work, government estimate, and cost estimates to be entered into Maximo and approved by Central Office for funding. Once funded, the DM work order can be developed into individual projects. BFM is also working to create Minor Improvement & Repair (MI&R) DM work orders from the ventilation reports that will increase the overall amount of work order dollars shown in the below table.

- **Hazardous Duty Pay:** BIE is requesting approval of Hazardous Duty Pay for BIE staff, both General Schedule (GS) and wage grade (WG) at Southwestern Indian Polytechnic Institute (SIPI) and Haskell Indian Nations University (HINU). Specifically, BIE is seeking hazardous duty pay for personnel performing the following functions: Residential,

Custodial, Food Service, Security, Academic, and Facilities, or are engaged in provision of in-person instruction or interaction with students, or other face-to-face in-person activities with staff or the public. Such payments would be limited to the times during which the respective staff are involved in providing such services on-site at their assigned duty station. These payments would not be made during times when employees are teleworking or when services are not being rendered in-person with students or the public, such as, but not limited to, Spring or Summer Break.

- Isleta Elementary School Retrocession: The BIE is continuing to work collaboratively with Isleta Pueblo’s Tribal Council and School Board to meet the June 1 transition date. On March 1, the BIE presented information regarding academic performance, enrollment, the process of retrocession including finances and personnel, and future technical assistance plans. In addition, BIE Staff are on-site weekly at Isleta Elementary to provide direct support to school leaders during this transition.

Week Ahead Schedule of Meetings, Media Interviews, Hearings and Travel (March 17 – March 28)

Bureau of Indian Education (BIE) Director Tony Dearman has no media interviews, hearings or travel scheduled during this time period. Director Dearman and BIE continue to hold meetings to advance work on BIE's mental health contract; distance learning leadership team coordination; coordinating with Indian Health Service (IHS) on vaccine distribution to BIE schools/employees; Tribal Colleges and Universities funding equity, and Department of Education assessment waiver for school year 2020-2021.

On March 16, Director Dearman will participate in a panel during the 2021 virtual National Indian Education Association (NIEA) on the Hill conference. The panel is titled *Administration Updates: Supporting Native Students at the National Level*, and Director Dearman will provide an update on the BIE's work to advance opportunities and resources for Native students. NIEA is the Nation's most inclusive advocacy organization advancing comprehensive culture-based educational opportunities for American Indians, Alaska Natives, and Native Hawaiians.

On March 24, Director Dearman will participate in the Bureau Operated Residential Schools meeting that includes BIE education program administrators (EPA) and school principals, as well as continue to participate in weekly EPA calls with their respective schools to receive school updates and concerns directly from the local level as the BIE works to continually improve its communications and services. Director Dearman is meeting with individual principals and school leaders to understand the issues facing their students, staff and Tribal communities, particularly as they work to serve during the pandemic.

BIE School Operations Budget Office continues to monitor Every Student Succeeds Act (ESSA) grants and BIE regulatory funding balances to obligate available balances to BIE-funded schools. The table below shows balances as of March 5, 2021. The BIE Budget Office continues to work to fully obligate funds by their expiration.

NEW ITEMS

Last week, Pine Hill school, a K-12 tribally controlled school on the Navajo Reservation, experienced a complete power outage of facilities due to problems with the electrical system. BIA and BIE facilities staff had a conference call on March 4 to receive a status update on the outage. The school's contractor presented three options to repair the system. BIA and BIE facilities staff are currently considering the options before moving forward with repairs. Presently, Pine Hill school facilities are running on generators.

On March 9, the BIE Education Program Administrator (EPA) for Navajo Tribally Controlled Schools had a conversation with the Pine Hill school superintendent Dr. Juanita Becenti. Dr. Becenti informed the EPA that unbeknownst to her, the Ramah Navajo School Board (RNSB) passed a resolution to immediately open the school to hybrid learning and sports despite the Navajo Nation public health emergency order. On March 5, five student protestors came on campus carrying signs stating that the school is turning them away and not allowing students to play sports. The students were not wearing masks or social distancing and there was no adult supervision. Security was called and they asked students to leave campus. Dr. Becenti noted that the Ramah law enforcement captain has informed her that RNSB does not fall under the Navajo Nation health requirements as they receive their funds from the Southwest BIA region. Dr. Becenti contacted the Navajo Department of Dine Education (DODE) and explained the situation and was informed by DODE that Ramah is on the Navajo Nation and is to follow the health orders. Moreover, Dr. Becenti also reports a Pine Hill school teacher/athletic director is defying the Navajo Nation health order and has allowed students to come onto campus several times. Dr. Becenti believes there needs to be clarification regarding RNSB's authority over Pine Hill school vis-à-vis Navajo Nation's public health emergency order.

Department of Education (ED) IDEA Part B Grant Award for FFY 2021: BIE Division of Performance and Accountability (DPA) Special Education Program has received the grant award application from ED's Office of Special Education Programs (OSEP). The completed application, with additional assurances to receive the funds, will be posted to the BIE website for a 60-day comment period from March 21, 2021 to May 21, 2021. The application is due May 21, 2021. IDEA Part B funds must be used only to pay the excess costs of providing a free and appropriate public education (FAPE) to children with disabilities.

As of March 17, BIE has received a request for applications for four (4) new Family and Child Education (FACE) programs. Currently BIE has 48 FACE programs nationally. FACE is designed as a family literacy program that is an integrated model for an early childhood/parental involvement program for American Indian families in BIE-funded schools.

ONGOING ITEMS

The BIE Division of Performance & Accountability (DPA) supports BIE schools receiving formula and discretionary grants from the ED. Numerous technical assistance presentations, including grant fiscal and programmatic implementation are provided by DPA staff on content expertise, evidence-based tools and resources, and direct support to effectively address grantee needs and assist with implementation of federal programs across key program areas under the Every Student Succeeds Act of 2015 (ESSA) and the Individuals with Disabilities Education Act of 2004 (IDEA).

Through this work, DPA is dedicated to improving results for students with disabilities. DPA is working with BIE Associate Deputy Directors (ADD), Education Program Administrators (EPAP), Education Resource

Center (ERC) staff, school administrators and staff, related services providers, and parents of children with disabilities to provide monthly universal technical assistance webinars that provide information regarding relevant special education topics, activities, and upcoming monthly webinars. The universal technical assistance webinars have been widely attended and DPA has received positive feedback from all participants regarding their subject matter expertise and DPA’s communication and collaboration. UPDATED ITEMS

Twenty-one (21) schools and/or Tribes have requested technical assistance to waive or submitted formal requests to waive the BIE’s first-ever Standards, Assessments and Accountability System (SAAS) or individual assessments for English Language Arts/Math, Science, Alternate, and English Language Proficiency. BIE is evaluating each request and working with ED for their review. BIE leadership had originally hoped the single system – as compared to the BIE’s former 23-state system based on the State where BIE schools are located – would improve data tracking and tailored support to schools. However, numerous Tribal governments are now requesting to waive the BIE’s unified system in part or –in whole. BIE SAAS waivers must meet the requirements of section 1111 of the Elementary and Secondary Education Act (ESEA) of 1965, as amended by the Every Student Succeeds Act (ESSA), Public Law 114-95, enacted December 10, 2015, and be approved by the Secretary of the Interior and the Secretary of Education.

- **To’Hajiilee Day School Facility Assessment:** On March 3-4, the Division of Facilities Management and Construction (DFMC) conducted a Facility Condition Assessment (FCA) of To’Hajiilee Day School, a Tribally Controlled School located on the Navajo Nation in New Mexico. The results of the FCA assessment indicate the primary education building may be structurally comprised and recommends immediate closure of the school grounds until a detailed structural investigation can be conducted. The BIE is collaborating with DFMC, the Navajo Nation and School Leaders on the following:
 - Implementation of the School’s Emergency Action Plan and Communication Plan for the closure of the school.
 - Scheduling of Structural Assessment by Martin & Martin, Inc. Consulting Engineers.

- **Strengthening Student Resiliency:** BIE’s Behavioral Health and Wellness Program will launch an interactive online training course in DOI Talent and eDOIU titled: Strengthening Student Resiliency. This course highlights various strategies for supporting students who have experienced trauma. The course is open to any staff or employees working for any bureau-funded school, dormitory, institution or program.

- **Background Check DTLL Distribution:** In the next two weeks the BIE will disseminate the DTLL on Background Checks to Tribal Leaders, School Boards, School Leaders and stakeholders. The plans for dissemination of the letter are as follows:
 - Follow up phone calls will be made to Tribal Leaders that have been actively involved in the determination of the DTLL on background checks for school board members.
 - Announcements at School Leader meetings: The respective Associate Deputy Directors (ADDs) meet regularly with school leaders and will announce and share the letter at upcoming meetings.
 - The ADDs plan to send the DTLL directly to school boards and staff will follow up to ensure receipt.
 - BIE’s School Board Training Staff will also disseminate the letter with their school board training participants and will announce the information in future trainings.

The DTLL will be posted on our webpage and social media platforms.

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- New Mexico Teacher Pay: On March 14, the BIE will meet with the New Mexico Public Education Department's Indian Education Division to discuss the passing of Senate Bill 1: Increasing Salary for Licensed Teachers and how it will impact BIE's teacher pay in New Mexico (NM). Furthermore, this Bill makes NM the leader in teacher pay in the region and school leaders have expressed concern about competition for teachers to leave bureau-funded schools to work at NM's Public Schools. The BIE is currently looking into teacher pay parity for schools in NM that may be impacted.
- Annual Fiscal and Programmatic Monitoring: Starting the week of March 14, the BIE's Performance Office will conduct the Annual Fiscal and Programmatic Monitoring of six schools. The schools identified for the monitoring were based on their scores from BIE's High Risk and Fiscal Matrix.
- US Department of Education Native Language Listening Session: On March 17, the U.S. Department of Education (ED) will host a listening session on Native languages. ED invited BIE to partner and representatives from the BIE will participate.

- Blackfeet Tribal senior citizen center construction project: Belcourt, North Dakota, BIE operated Education Program Administrator (EPA) met with a member of the United States Air Force Air National Guard (National Guard). National Guard representative communicated that it is the Blackfeet Tribe's desire to contract with Bureau of Indian Affairs/BIE to use the BIE Operated Blackfeet Boarding Dormitory from June thru September 2022. The purpose of the contracting would be to provide sleeping quarters and dining facilities for participants in the Tribal construction project of a senior citizen center in

Heart Butte, MT. EPA will coordinate with BIA to determine if the use is allowable.

- **Ventilation Assessments:** BIE Branch of Facility Management (BFM) staff conducted assessments for 100% of BIE-funded schools. BFM staff continue to contact schools listed as “Priority” on the Ventilation Assessments list, shown below, to ensure schools are taking action on recommendations and interim measures. BFM is also providing technical assistance to school facility managers to enter Deferred Maintenance (DM) work orders for project-based actions above the \$2500 threshold. The DM work orders require a scope of work, government estimate, and cost estimates to be entered into Maximo and approved by Central Office for funding. Once funded, the DM work order can be developed into individual projects. BFM is also working to create Minor Improvement & Repair (MI&R) DM work orders from the ventilation reports that will increase the overall amount of work order dollars shown in the below table.

- **To’Hajiilee Day School Facility Assessment:** On March 3-4, the Division of Facilities Management and Construction (DFMC) conducted a Facility Condition Assessment (FCA) of To’Hajiilee Day School, a Tribally Controlled School located on the Navajo Nation in New Mexico. The results of the FCA assessment indicate the primary education building may be structurally comprised and recommends immediate closure of the school grounds until a detailed structural investigation can be conducted. The BIE is collaborating with DFMC, the Navajo Nation and School Leaders on the following:
 - Implementation of the School’s Emergency Action Plan and Communication Plan for the closure of the school.
 - Scheduling of Structural Assessment by Martin & Martin, Inc. Consulting Engineers.

- **Strengthening Student Resiliency:** BIE’s Behavioral Health and Wellness Program will launch an interactive online training course in DOI Talent and eDOIU titled: Strengthening Student Resiliency. This course highlights various strategies for supporting students who have experienced trauma. The course is open to any staff or employees working for any bureau-funded school, dormitory, institution or program.

- **Background Check DTLL Distribution:** In the next two weeks the BIE will disseminate the DTLL on Background Checks to Tribal Leaders, School Boards, School Leaders and stakeholders. The plans for dissemination of the letter are as follows:
 - Follow up phone calls will be made to Tribal Leaders that have been actively involved in the determination of the DTLL on background checks for school board members.
 - Announcements at School Leader meetings: The respective Associate Deputy Directors (ADDs) meet regularly with school leaders and will announce and share the letter at upcoming meetings.

). BIE has received approximately 36 requests from various entities, including tribes and BIE-funded schools, to waive the requirement to administer state assessments this school year. The justifications for the requests include the need to protect the health and safety of students, families, staff and tribal communities, as well concerns that administering the assessments would violate tribes' stay-at-home orders and other COVID-19 related restrictions. State assessments are required each year by the Elementary and Secondary Education Act of 1965 (ESEA), Pub. L. 89-10. Consequences of not testing students could result in BIE being out of compliance and put on a corrective action plan.

Based on recommendations received during Tribal/Interior Budget Committee meetings (TIBC), the BIE will host two virtual tribal listening sessions on April 13 and April 15 to receive recommendations for updating the Indian School Equalization Program (ISEP) and the ISEP Student Transportation formulas and respective distribution methodologies. The listening sessions will inform formal consultation regarding ISEP and transportation formulas to take place this summer. The BIE also invites school boards, parents, Indian organizations, and other interested parties to participate in the listening sessions so that Tribes and BIE stakeholders may have the opportunity to discuss the need for updates not only with BIE representatives, but with other stakeholders. ISEP provides for the uniform direct funding of Bureau operated and tribally controlled K-12 schools, boarding schools, and dormitories. ISEP transportation covers how transportation mileage and funds for schools are calculated under the ISEP transportation program. The program funds transportation of students from home to school and return.

ONGOING ITEMS

On April 16, Southwestern Indian Polytechnic Institute (SIPI), a BIE operated post-secondary institution located in Albuquerque, NM, will host its Spring 2021 virtual commencement ceremony. On February 19, SIPI sent a letter of invitation to then U.S. Congresswoman Deb Haaland to serve as keynote speaker for the ceremony. BIE will work with the Department regarding the request now that Deb Haaland has been confirmed Department of the Interior Secretary.

The BIE DPA supports BIE schools receiving formula and discretionary grants from the ED. Numerous technical assistance presentations, including grant fiscal and programmatic implementation are provided by DPA staff on content expertise, evidence-based tools and resources, and direct support to effectively address grantee needs and assist with implementation of federal programs across key program areas under the Every Student Succeeds Act of 2015 (ESSA) and the Individuals with Disabilities Education Act of 2004 (IDEA).

Through this work, DPA is dedicated to improving results for students with disabilities. DPA is working with

BIE Associate Deputy Directors (ADD), Education Program Administrators (EPA), Education Resource Center (ERC) staff, school administrators and staff, related services providers, and parents of children with disabilities to provide monthly universal technical assistance webinars that provide information regarding relevant special education topics, activities, and upcoming monthly webinars. The universal technical assistance webinars have been widely attended and DPA has received positive feedback from participants regarding their subject matter expertise and DPA's communication and collaboration. UPDATED ITEMS

Twenty-two (22) schools and/or Tribes have requested technical assistance to waive or submitted formal requests to waive the BIE's first-ever Standards, Assessments and Accountability System (SAAS) or individual assessments for English Language Arts/Math, Science, Alternate, and English Language Proficiency. BIE is evaluating each request and working with ED for their review. BIE leadership had originally hoped the single system – as compared to the BIE's former 23-state system based on the state where BIE schools are located – would improve data tracking and tailored support to schools. However, numerous Tribal governments are now requesting to waive the BIE's unified system in part or in whole. BIE SAAS waivers must meet the requirements of section 1111 of the Elementary and Secondary Education Act (ESEA) of 1965, as amended by the Every Student Succeeds Act (ESSA), Public Law 114-95, enacted December 10, 2015, and be approved by the Secretary of the Interior and the Secretary of Education.

The remaining 17 schools are operating completely remotely using distance learning educational models to support educational continuity for students.

Tribally Controlled Schools: Of the 98 Tribally Controlled Schools, 11 schools are operating under a traditional, onsite classroom setting, while 30 schools are operating with a hybrid learning model consisting of onsite and remote learning models. The remaining 53 schools are operating completely remotely using distance learning educational models to support educational continuity for students.

Navajo Schools: To adhere to local Tribal orders, of the 64 schools serving the Navajo Nation (both Bureau Operated and Tribally Controlled Schools), all 64 schools are operating remotely using distance learning educational models to support educational continuity for students. However, Richfield Residential Hall, a Tribally Controlled peripheral dormitory facility that supports a local public high school, is open for onsite services for Native youth.

- Cove Day School and Red Rock Day School Potential Consolidation: Cove Day School, a K-6 School, and Red Rock Day School, a K-8 School, both located on the Navajo Nation in Arizona are considering consolidation due to environmental concerns. The BIE is evaluating the situation and will provide a plan in the coming weeks.
- Collateral Duty Safety Officer (CDSO) and Safety Committee: Director Dearman signed an updated policy memorandum, providing that all BIE funded schools shall establish both a Collateral Duty Safety Officer (CDSO) and Safety Committee. This language updates a previous memorandum from 2018, with new language is more specific to the schools. BIE Branch of Safety Management will provide to schools and coordinate a meeting with the principals to assist with implementing this new policy.

 - Implementation of the School's Emergency Action Plan and Communication Plan for the closure of the buildings.
 - Scheduling of Structural Integrity Study.
- **BIE Unified Assessment:** The BIE Unified Assessments for the Spring 2022 Testing Windows have been extended. Below are the current testing dates:
 - English Language Proficiency, January 24 – March 11, 2022
 - ELA/Math, March 21 – May 13, 2022
 - Science, April 4 – May 20, 2022
 - Alternate (ELA/Math/Science), March 14 – April 29, 2022
- **Ventilation Assessments:** BIE Branch of Facility Management (BFM) staff conducted assessments for 100% of BIE-funded schools. BFM staff continue to contact schools listed as "Priority" on the Ventilation Assessments list, shown below, to ensure schools are taking action on recommendations and interim measures. BFM is also providing technical assistance to school facility managers to enter Deferred Maintenance (DM) work orders for project-based actions above the \$2500 threshold. The DM work orders require a scope of work, government estimate, and cost estimates to be entered into Maximo and approved by Central Office for funding. Once funded, the DM work orders can be developed into individual projects. BFM is also working to create Minor Improvement & Repair (MI&R) DM work orders from the ventilation reports that will increase the overall amount of work order dollars shown in the below table.

[REDACTED] In addition, this week two counselors from Indian Health Services (IHS) visited the school, unannounced, to assess high need students. The IHS Counselors did not share any information regarding the outcome of the assessments. (b) (6)
[REDACTED]. IHS staff stated that they would provide the school with a plan to provide follow-on therapy services, but no such plan has yet been provided to the school. The Pine Ridge Education Program Administrator and BIE Behavioral Health Specialist continue to advocate for improved communication from IHS and for additional counselors to be sent to the school to provide follow-up counseling services.
- **Background Check DTLL Distribution Update:** The BIE has disseminated the DTLL on Background Checks to Tribal Leaders, School Boards, School Leaders and stakeholders. Several stakeholders are requesting clarification on the letter and the BIE is responding. - **To’Hajiilee Day School Facility Closure:** As shared previously, on March 10 the BIE closed two buildings due to safety concerns. A **Structural Engineering Report** has been complete and one of the two buildings was recommended for re-occupancy. The BIE is working with the Division of Facilities Management and Construction (DFMC), the Navajo Nation and school leaders to determine next steps. To’Hajiilee Day School is continuing to provide remote instruction.

NEW ITEMS

- St. Stephens Indian School: On April 27, BIE met with Tribal leaders, Chairman Dresser and Chairman St. Claire, to discuss BIE’s internal administrative evaluation. During the conference call Mr. Jackie Shamblin, BIE Human Resource Director, provided an overview of findings and BIE recommendations. Due to the concern regarding the administrative findings, the BIE recommended St. Stephens Indian School retrocede back to the BIE. The Tribal leaders want to continue as a Tribally Controlled School (TCS). The BIE Director communicated the administrative findings must be resolved to continue as a TCS School and added that the findings will be released to the State of Wyoming and the Office of Inspector General. The BIE will continue to support their education programs and assist staff with the end of year closeout reports and have scheduled follow up meetings with the Tribal Council regarding next steps.

- Principals Leadership Academy (PLA) Update: The BIE has hosted two leadership academy sessions with school leaders from within bureau-funded schools. The next session will be held next week, June 28-30, in Riverside, CA. The last PLA scheduled for July 12-14 in Albuquerque, NM, will be moved to a virtual session due to the high community spread of COVID-19 in the area.

Division of Environmental Cultural Resource Management has reported to have approximately \$250,000 in emergency funding available to commit to the effort.

Due to the current average daily membership of students this addition will require further review.  - Consolidate both schools at a new location = \$44.4M
 - Expand Red Rock Day School to accommodate Cove Day School needs = \$43.3M

- To’Hajiilee Day School Flooding: To’Hajiilee Day School is experiencing flooding due to recent rains. The BIE Branch of Environmental Management (BEM) is providing support in partnership with the Navajo Regional Office and provided approximately 38,000 sandbags to minimize flooding. In addition, the BIE BFM and Branch of Environmental Management are working to complete preliminary project design for an onsite water filtration system to provide the school with clean odor free drinking water until the City of Albuquerque completes the water pipeline to the community and the school expected the Fall of 2023.

- School Operations Partnership with US Public Health Service: The BIE’s School Operations Department is collaborating with the US Public Health Service (PHS) on water system assessments and radon assessments. Some of these assessments are currently being conducted however additional plans are being made to ensure schools have additional monitoring.

- St. Stephen School Update: The BIE is continuing to support the retrocede of St. Stephens Indian School, a K-12 school located in Wyoming. During the month of June, St. Stephens School hosted townhall meetings in the community to address any questions, concerns and gain feedback on the retrocession of the school to BIE. The townhalls were very productive and the community was positive about the retrocession. Two additional

meetings will be held with the community until the transition is final. Currently, the BIE is hiring school staff and is on track to open the school on September 12.

NEW ITEMS

- Road to Healing Listening Session: The BIE worked closely with Riverside Indian School to prepare and host the first listening session hosted by the Secretary of the Department of Interior’s “Road to Healing.” The purpose of the session was to share stories from boarding school survivors. The event was widely attended with tribal leaders and tribal members coming from around the state.

ONGOING ITEMS

- Principals Leadership Academy (PLA) Update: The BIE has hosted four leadership academy sessions with school leaders from within bureau-funded schools. The last session will be held next week, July 12-14. Nearly 150 participants joined the virtual session from across the country.
- To’Hajiilee Day School Flooding: To’Hajiilee Day School is experiencing flooding due to recent rains. The BIE Branch of Environmental Management (BEM) is providing support in partnership with the Navajo Regional Office and provided approximately 38,000 sandbags to minimize flooding. In addition, the BIE BFM and Branch of Environmental Management are working to complete preliminary project design for an onsite water filtration system to provide the school with clean odor free drinking water until the City of Albuquerque completes the water pipeline to the community and the school expected the Fall of 2023.
- St. Stephens School Update: The BIE is continuing to support the retrocede of St. Stephens Indian School, a K-12 school located in Wyoming. During the month of June, St. Stephens School hosted townhall meetings in the community to address any questions, concerns and gain feedback on the retrocession of the school to BIE. The townhalls were very productive and the community was positive about the retrocession. Two additional

meetings will be held with the community until the transition is final. Currently, the BIE is hiring school staff and is on track to open the school on September 12.

- Cove Day School Replacement Project: The BIE is looking into replacing Cove Day School a bureau operated school on the Navajo nation in Arizona. There are currently 3 options for the replacement which are listed below. You may notice there is an option to consolidate Cove Day School and Red Rock Day School as both schools are in proximity.
 - Replace the Cove Day School = \$24.3M
 - Consolidate both schools at a new location = \$44.4M
 - Expand Red Rock Day School to accommodate Cove Day School needs = \$43.3M

The BIE recommends consolidating the two schools and build a new school in a location agreed upon by all stakeholders. Furthermore, the plans to consolidate will consider the concerns by the community to protect student, staff and the community from the environmental issues, that has historically impacted both schools and their communities.

- Pine Hill Construction Update: Pine Hill School submitted a deviation to the approved building design to include a 3rd Language & Culture Classroom. Due to the current average daily membership of students this addition will require further review. The Division of Facilities Management and Construction (DFMC) and the BIE are meeting to review the new submission and will provide a decision back to the Navajo leadership regarding this request.
- 2022 Native Language Summit: Tuesday October 4, 9am-3pm in Oklahoma City.
- Nation Building Training Planning: In partnership with the Bureaus that work closely with Tribes and Nations within the Department of Interior (DOI), the BIE is collaborating to develop an internal Nation Building Training. The purpose of the training is to provide DOI staff training to support their relationship building and work with Tribes/Nations. The Nation Building Training is still in the planning stages with a goal to develop a training for DOI Staff within the 2023 Fiscal Year.
