Government security clearance to In the last several years has come to the attention of several congressional committees after his employment at the National Security Agency (NSA) was terminated. Was a civilian employee of NSA from November 2002 until 16 May 2005 when he was removed for failure to maintain a mandatory condition of employment — an SCI level security clearance. Prior to his employment at NSA, was a civilian employee of the Defense Intelligence Agency (DIA) from January 1999 to 2 November 2002; and held SGI access. (C//REL) On 8 August 2007, the Associate Directorate for Security and Counterintelligence (ADS&CI) was advised that had recently been granted a U.S. Government security clearance as a defense contractor (not for NSA). A review of the Department of Defense Joint Personnel Adjudications System (JPAS) revealed that current clearance was apparently granted under the rules of reciprocity based on a DIA record from 1999, which had not been amended upon his resignation from DIA. JPAS record also did not reflect his loss of clearances from NSA, because we refrain from including civilian employees' personnel security data on the internet-based JPAS since it potentially exposes our employees who serve in and out of covered positions throughout their career. We did, however, notify DIA telephonically in May 2005 of debriefing, as we routinely do when one of our affiliates is debriefed for cause. Once we learned of the recent reinstatement of clearances, DIA officials were immediately contacted and they updated his JPAS records to reflect "foss of jurisdiction" a term used in JPAS to state that the listed sponsor no longer maintains oversight of the individuals' clearance. DIA subsequently effected debrief as a result of this updated JPAS action.

(U//FOUO) In April 2009 NSA/CSS formed a study team to review its oversight and compliance activities across all mission areas. A key finding of the team, based in part on discussions with Congress, was the need to establish an enterprise-level compliance position, modeled on the Chief Compliance Officer construct found in the private sector. I am pleased to report that we have created the new position of NSA/CSS Director of Compliance, who will report directly to the NSA/CSS Deputy Director and me.

(U/FGUO) The Director of Compliance will have several important authorities—primarily the development, implementation, and monitoring of a comprehensive compliance program. This compliance program will include: (1) integrating compliance strategies and activities across NSA/CSS mission, technology, and policy organizations; (2) ensuring a robust compliance training and education program; and (3) maintaining and reporting on a comprehensive status of mission compliance at NSA/CSS, including performing trend analysis and ensuring prompt corrective measures. This new office will complement and reinforce a robust intelligence oversight program carried out by the NSA/CSS Inspector General and the oversight responsibilities of the NSA/CSS General Counsel.

(U/FOUO) The new Director of Compliance will be responsible for continuous modernization and enforcement of our mission compliance strategies and activities to ensure their relevance and effectiveness. At the same time, this new position will serve as an ongoing reminder of the importance of compliance work, and provide greater visibility and transparency in this essential area.

(U//FOUO) I have selected Mr. John DeLong to serve as the first Director of Compliance. He is currently the Deputy Director of the NSA/CSS Commercial Solutions Center (NCSC) and has 12 years of experience at NSA/CSS in a broad range of activities from technical, to mission, to policy. Mr. DeLong is widely recognized and respected for his strong leadership qualities and his integrity. He holds a B.A. in Physics and Mathematics from Harvard College and a J.D. from Harvard Law School.
